Denial is not a river...

"Your daughter has something in her lung. She needs to have it removed, and it needs to be today."

My daughter was eighteen months old when she inhaled a popcorn seed deep into her left lung. It was a big deal and had to be surgically removed. When the doctor used words like "Probability of death" and, "She could incur permanent damage", well let's just say that I handled it like I usually handle anything that scares me. "This doctor is nuts", I said to my wife, "We should get a second opinion."

And some vodka, I thought to myself.

Denial. The first of the five stages of grief. Denial not only presents itself in my life when someone dies, but whenever anything happens that involves having to accept any kind of change that scares me. I go into denial at work, over finances, with my kids, my wife, my sponsor... Doesn't matter. If something is about to happen, and I don't want it to happen, then it didn't ever happen. Denial is one of my defects of character, it is the first aggressive angle I take to say, "No." I have to say no to myself before I say no to anyone or anything else.

As an alcoholic, I use denial as a weapon in the form of arrogance, because I really, really want things to go on as they were. Especially when it came to my drinking, I was unbreakable. People tend to retreat when I get snide and cocky, I'm really good at it, and I'm even better at it when I'm hammered. There wasn't a spouse, a parent, a therapist, a friend or a religion that could convince me that I had a problem. And even when alcohol stopped working for me physically, mentally, spiritually, and socially, I still wanted it in my life. That is how powerful the obsession was for me.

I did not want to stop drinking, so when I got to AA and accidentally got a sponsor, I did what any outstanding drunk would do when it came to Step One, I faked it. "Oh, yes. I am an alcoholic. I am powerless over alcohol, sure my life is unmanageable". I said. I am ready for step two, suckers! But as I faked it, even though I was staying sober, my life got worse. My wife asked for a divorce after I got sober, my relationship with my kids broke after I got sober, I saw my financial situation failing after I got sober, I realized I had no friends after... shall I go on?

My life really was unmanageable. It's amazing what a few weeks of "undrunkness" will show a person. I was in serious denial over all of it. I have said it in meetings a million times, the only thing that alcohol has ever given me was the gift of desperation. Desperation to try a couple of new things that were foreign to me... Honesty and God.

Not sure about anyone else, but I was terrible at honesty when I got to AA. I lied and distorted everything for personal gain and to avoid confrontation. Even when I could tell the truth, I lied. Just a little tweak here and a little fake there and I looked like an even bigger hero, or a much more generous person, or a martyr, or just an all around great guy. It took a lot for me to go to a meeting and finally admit that I used alcohol to fix my life and that I didn't want to stop, that I was scared, unhappy and alone. But, from that moment on, my life has not been the same.

That was my first lesson in true acceptance. It is the shortcoming that eventually overcomes denial in my world. I don't have to be okay with a situation just yet, I just have to stop denying that it's there. If I work an honest program, acceptance soon follows. I did get to make one choice as an alcoholic, I got to pick a cool higher power, and that higher power will exist as long as I try to give him my life and connect with him every single day.

Every now and then the old version of me pops in for a sneak attack, but it is only temporary, thanks to the resources that AA has given me... Meetings, a good sponsor, literature, a good conversation with any other alcoholic, and some service work. It is all wrapped up in the power of my God.

I pray for the newcomer and for anyone who is starting over in this program that they get a good sponsor to take them through honest step work, so that they can ultimately seek and find a higher power to manage their daily lives.

God was there for my daughter during her surgery, even though I didn't know him very well at the time, he was there. He was always around, actually. With the help of AA, I can see him in my life now, and it is amazing.

For today, I feel that AA is and always will be a part of my life. God willing, I'm not in denial about that.

Humbly asked Him to remove our shortcomings

FOR ME, at first glance Step Seven seemed a cinch, especially in comparison to some of the preceding Steps. As is often the case, on closer examination the seemingly simple proved to be anything but! I thought this Step was only a kind of mopping-up maneuver or an interlude where I could rest on my laurels. (I was wearing them in the wrong place at the time.) Steps One through Six had shown me how inadequate my own powers and resources were--as far as my alcoholism was concerned. Besides, I had to be entirely ready to part with my defects (Step Six), and I wasn't at all ready.

The earlier Steps, however, had removed some of the careful padding from my ego, and a remark made by an old-timer and dear friend had helped. I had heard one member complimented by another for a wonderful talk. The speaker said, "Don't thank me or give me credit. Give God the credit." I was determined that if ever anyone thanked me for my talk, I would say the same thing (humbly, of course).

Finally, my old-timer friend did compliment me on my talk one night, and I did say, "Don't thank me. God did it."

The old-timer smiled, put his arm about me, and said, "Honey, it wasn't *that* good!" Up until that time I had thought "humble" was some kind of pie.

I knew from the beginning that my vices were 'way ahead of my virtues. That was bad. Worse, some of my vices were being classed as virtues. But, since other members seemed to be gaining on their vices, I could hope for myself. By this time, introspection had become somewhat habitual, and I realized that I would have many hang-ups in working these Steps, as I'd had hangovers during the wet years (or should I say the monsoons?).

In Step Seven, the word "humbly" threw a monkey wrench into my sensitive emotional gears. Oh, what it did to my poor id! It seemed I was forever searching feverishly through all the dictionaries I could lay hands on for a definition of "humble" that I could accept. Even the excellent coverage of this aspect in the "Twelve and Twelve" availed me nothing. Humble? Humbug! Hadn't I always been the one put upon? The doormat type? Was I now to wear sackcloth and ashes or a hair shirt?

All my life, I'd been taught that I alone was responsible for my character, including my shortcomings--responsible for self-discipline and self-reliance also. That reminds me of the fellow who claimed that he was a self-made man, whereupon his friend remarked that this belief certainly relieved God of an embarrassing responsibility!

Still, I could plainly see the golden thread of true humility running through all the Steps, and I knew how very important humility was to my continued sobriety. I became reconciled to the definition I found in a new, revised dictionary: "Humble indicates a personal realization of smallness, without loss of respect, and differs from humiliation, which implies public shame in front of others or being made to seem foolish or inferior" and "to be neither inordinately proud of our talents and assets, nor ashamed of our defects or failures, nor unduly on the defensive over them." Also: "free from vanity."

In other words (I quote Tryon Edwards): "True humility is not an abject, despising spirit; it is but a right estimate of ourselves as God sees us."

My willingness to have my defects of character removed was bolstered by the realization that little, if any, spiritual growth was possible as long as I held on to my old ideas and defects. The words in our Big Book keep appearing before me: "Burn the idea into the consciousness of every man that he can get well, regardless of anyone. The only condition is that he trust in God and clean house." This is what Step Seven is to me; it means I am going to clean house and I will have all the help I need. By taking this Step, I am not *giving up* anything; I am getting rid of whatever might lead me to drink again and whatever might prevent achieving real serenity. Now, with God's help and my own cooperation, via Step Seven, I can become on the individual level a first-rate power, instead of the second-rate power that I was before AA. (I was truly suffering from an immense power failure--or bad wiring.)

I have a favorite reminder which helps me keep Step Seven in view: "At moments she discovered she was grotesquely wrong, and then she treated herself to a week of passionate humility." This quote from the works of Henry James has become part of my inventory.

I believe that through the first six Steps I have gained some knowledge of my character defects and that I know (at least in part and at times) what I need to get rid of! It is certainly no problem for me to humbly ask my Higher Power to remove them, either. I never *did* know what to do with them before. Besides, my pride is the only thing I can swallow any more that is nonfattening. In fact, this diet tends to reduce the ego and eliminate fatheads--mine, anyhow.

Step Seven simple? Not on your ego!

Traditions Checklist

Tradition Seven: Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

1. **Honestly now, do I do all I can to help AA (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new guy who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when tanked in a barroom?**
2. **Should the Grapevine sell advertising space to book publishers and drug companies, so it could make a big profit and become a bigger magazine, in full color, at a cheaper price per copy?**
3. **If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be okay to let the government subsidize AA groups in hospitals and prisons?**
4. **Is it more important to get a big AA collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate?**
5. **Is a group treasurer's report unimportant AA business? How does the treasurer feel about it?**
6. **How important in my recovery is the feeling of self-respect, rather than the feeling of being always under obligation for charity received?**

Passing the Basket . . . Or Passing the Buck?

WHEN I WAS newly sober in AA, fourteen years ago, I seldom attended a meeting without taking a pamphlet to read. I always had at least two cups of coffee, and if there was anything to eat, I ate. When the basket was passed, I always put a quarter in it--for two people, my wife and me. If we could truly stretch a dollar as far as I must have thought we could, the financial world would be beating a path to our doorsteps to learn AA's remarkable brand of economics.

Most of us decry the fact that more than forty percent of the groups do not support the Fellowship. When it comes to AA's being self-supporting, many fail to recognize one important aspect: If we aren't even willing to pay our own way at a meeting, how can we expect the group to support the Fellowship? What we need to realize is that we *are* the groups, and we *are* Alcoholics Anonymous. I have seen AAs spend more money at a coffee shop than they would ever think of putting in the collection at a meeting.

Early in my sobriety, it was explained that it was imperative for me to get my priorities in order. Learning to become responsible was one of them. This financial buck-passing certainly seems to run counter to responsibility. If we want "the hand of AA always to be there," we each need to assume our own share of responsibility. If money and spirituality do mix in the basket, as the "Twelve and Twelve" says, then how much better they will blend when money is used to perpetuate AA by making more Twelfth Step work possible.

We, who have had so much given to us freely--in love, with no strings attached--sometimes forget that this also is an area where we have to give it away to keep it. One of the promises in the Big Book is freedom from "fear of economic insecurity." Long ago, one of my sponsors suggested that if I stayed sober and tried to live along spiritual lines, my needs would always be met. Today, I can honestly say that never has there been an instance where I have given of myself, financially or otherwise, and have not been compensated many times over. Our family has never lacked anything because we accepted our responsibility to help carry the message.

God has given each of us a share of the responsibility. He has given each of us the tools to work with and the ability to use them. Let's all of us assume our shares so that we may all reap ever-increasingly the fruits of selflessness and love in service to our Fellowship.





My name is Beth H. and I'm an alcoholic.

I'm one of the founding members of this secular AA group. Not the main one or the most important one, but I'm only speaking for myself as to why this meeting was started.

I was raised in a Christian church and had no problem with it, nor do I have any resentment toward it or bad memories of it. But one day in about 10th grade I stopped believing. I'm a very skeptical, analytical person by nature. I don't go in for supernatural explanations. I believe in coincidences.

Anyhow, when I got sober in 1985, I tried very hard to become a believer again. I pursued it for many years because I was told I had to or I would get drunk. I attended three different churches over the years. I studied cultural anthropology, thinking that if deep down inside every person there is the idea of God, I would learn how to strip away the cultural trappings and uncover the essence. I ended up with a master's degree but all the more confirmed in my belief that cultures invent higher powers to suit their purposes. Remember, this is my personal belief and I do not speak for all the group members. The point is, I was open-minded and did my due diligence to become a believer, but the bottom line is that I cannot just make myself believe something no matter how much I may want to.

After a while, I started feeling like a second-class citizen in AA. I beat myself up mercilessly over being close-minded as Bill called it, having too much intellectual pride as Bob called it. When I got to AA I had really low self-esteem and believed I was a defective human being, and this part of AA was feeding right into that instead of helping with it. It is pretty miserable to feel like you don't fit in anywhere, and then you find AA, and then you realize you don't fit in there either, especially if it's the last house on the block.

But I did fit into AA in every other respect. I love AA. I love the fellowship. I love meetings except when the topic is Higher Power, and I definitely tune out when they read How It Works or say the Lord's Prayer. I love that everyone admits they are flawed, and we meet on this common ground and love each other back to health. I have definitely had a psychic change. All the promises have come true for me. I would only change one word, that AA, not God, is doing for me what I could not do for myself. I attribute my good fortune to the magic of one alcoholic talking to another.

After I'd been sober more than 20 years, I finally gave myself permission to be who I am. Our chips say, "To thine own self be true." Apparently it is possible to stay sober without a higher power, because I've been doing it. I decided not to beat myself up over it any more.

I discovered a website called aaagnostica.org. I found that there were others like me. It was wonderful to be able to speak freely and not be ashamed. I learned there was going to be the first ever international conference of We Agnostics and Freethinkers in AA in November of 2014 in Santa Monica. I attended the conference. I learned that there are hundreds of people who have stayed sober for decades without a higher power. It is AA's best kept secret. I ran into three other people I knew from the East Valley (but had no idea they were nonbelievers) and a few I didn't know. When we got back we started the Tempe We Agnostics meeting.

We Agnostics has been going since January 2015. We meet on Fridays and Sundays at 1:30 at the Pigeon Coop, and Tuesdays at 6:40pm at the Valley Alano Club. After we read the AA preamble, we read our own preamble.

AA agnostic meetings endeavor to maintain a tradition of free expression, and conduct a meeting where alcoholics may feel free to express any doubts or disbeliefs they may have, and to share their own personal form of spiritual experience, their search for it, or their rejection of it. In keeping with AA tradition, we do not endorse or oppose any form of religion or atheism. Our only wish is to ensure suffering alcoholics that they can find sobriety in AA without having to accept anyone else's beliefs, or having to deny their own.

We are very much a part of AA. We participate in EVI and GSO. I truly appreciate the East Valley Intergroup for not even balking at putting us on the meeting list, because some agnostic groups in other locations have not been so fortunate. We are not trying to change AA. We are making AA more inclusive. The only requirement is a desire to stop drinking. You will not hear God-bashing at our meetings except for the occasional newcomer who needs to vent. We just share what has worked for us. I don't want other like-minded newcomers to have to go through what I did before they can find peace and joy in sobriety. I would have found it much sooner if just one other person had told me, "It's OK if you don't believe. You can still stay sober, and you belong."
