A SPIRITUAL EXPERIENCE

Sober just a couple of months, I attended the 2105 Area 3 annual convention in Pinetop, AZ. I looked forward to escaping the Phoenix heat and partaking in my first AA convention in the cool pines of the Arizona mountains. I went by myself, but a couple from my home group was planning to attend, so chances were good that I would see at least one familiar face.

A new term jumped out at me from the convention program: "marathon meeting". Wanting to experience this new thing, I met up with an old timer from my home group and we went together. The topic of the morning meeting was about having a spiritual experience in sobriety.

Of the roughly 30 people in the meeting, I noticed a perhaps familiar face on a man who came in the room with his friends. He sat at a table across from me such that we were facing each other. I could not place the face, but thought maybe I recognized him. From television? A bus-stop ad? I did not think much of it, except for the fact that this guy was looking at me like he, too, saw in me a familiar face.

Toward the close of the meeting I took a turn to share my spiritual experience from a couple of months before. My experience of Goodness filling the void left by a departing force - the obsession to drink - was still very fresh in my memory. When I finished sharing, the meeting leader started his closing remarks, but he was stopped by this familiar face across from me. "May I share quickly?", the stranger interrupted. The leader allowed him to continue. "During the weeks before I got sober I was housesitting for a friend of mine and his wife. It was in that house that several things happened. One, I came face to face with my powerlessness over alcohol. Second, I bought 20 feet of rope with which to hang myself at this friend's house -the first time I finally acted on my despair. Third, I had my last drink there. And that was YOUR house, wasn't it, Tom?". I slowly nodded my head as I recognized who this guy was. Relieved at the confirmation, he continued, "I was staying at that house when, having been mandated to go to AA after a DUI, while at a meeting I "had my blinders removed" in a moment and completely accepted that I was an alcoholic... and I celebrated 21 years of sobriety this last week." "No way!", I blurted out loud. My eyes were opened and I recognized Scott, an old friend and drinking partner from Tucson that I had not seen for 20 years. The room was filled with puzzled faces and several gasps. After the meeting and a big hug, Scott explained to me that he hit bottom while house-sitting for me while I was out of town on vacation. He recalled for me how he had considered committing suicide in my house. Fortunately, he was unable to find my pistol (I took it with me on our trip), or a suitable branch on the trees in my yard for his rope. This failure bought him just enough time to have his eyes opened.

After hitting bottom in my living room Scott began his new, sober life about the same time my wife and I moved to from Tucson to Phoenix. Back then, I had no idea what a "bottom" was or that Scott had hit his in my house. My own bottom was 2 decades and 200 miles away.

Turns out that Scott's attendance at the Area 3 convention was a last-minute decision. And, at just a few months sober, my own attendance was a bit unusual. Whether mere coincidence or divine intervention, my re-kindled friendship with Scott has become yet another gift to me from God in AA. Scott shares with me his experience, strength and hope from his years of sobriety. An old friend became a blessing to this newcomer.

Children of a Higher Power

My name is Don. I am an alcoholic. I am also an agnostic. For someone as terminally smart as me, it's really important to admit I am 'without knowledge' – I don't 'know' God – but I have come to have faith in a Higher Power.

My early home was 'un-churched' as they say these days, but I was curious about religion. Dad was agnostic and Mom was uninterested in religion – even though her brother, my uncle was a Lutheran Pastor. At twelve, out of the blue, I asked my parents if I could attend a neighborhood church on my own. They did not discourage my spiritual exploration; in fact Dad would lead long discussions at the dinner table in which I was encouraged to think critically about faith.

By the time I reached high school, I had lost interest in organized religion. The obvious examples of the intolerance and outright cruelty of the true believers throughout history made religion seem hypocritical or worse. I declared myself an agnostic, but longed for something to give life meaning and perhaps ease Life's inevitable pain.

Alcohol was waiting to help. At 17, heartbroken by a girl's rejection, I raided my parents' liquor cabinet and had my first drink. I started drinking whiskey at 3:00 in the afternoon and crossed the invisible line by 3:30pm. My intention was to end it all. I quickly blacked out, then passed out. Ironically, this is precisely what happened again on the day, God willing, of my last drink.

Alcohol became my higher power. It was always there. When I felt anxious, which was most of the time, it made me feel comfortable. It did for me what I could not do for myself. I thought it made me eloquent, creative, and charming. I have two ex-wives who may have a different opinion. In time, alcohol also helped me become more isolated, depressed, lonely and alone. Relationships vanished.

During the second marriage, emotionally and spiritually bankrupt, I admitted myself to a hospital treatment program because I was 'exhausted'. I'd been drinking at least a quart of booze a day and on admission to the hospital the nurses said it was a good thing I decided to stop by because they were likely going to see me in the emergency room any day now.

In treatment, I was taken to my very first meeting of Alcoholics Anonymous. The people there were nice enough, but there was that 'God' thing, so I felt like I didn't really belong. Belief was okay for them if they needed it, but I was much too smart to need a crutch like that. As terrible as my life had gotten, I was still sure I didn't need to rely on any Supreme Being. At that time I was an agnostic with atheistic tendencies. Today, I am still an agnostic, but I lean heavily in the direction of Faith.

After treatment I stayed dry for almost two years. Predictably, without practicing the 12 Steps and without a spiritual awakening in my life, I was without defense against the first drink – I drank again - got sober again. and drank again, at one point bitterly shouting at God, "If this is how you're going to take care of me, go take care of someone else!" It would be twelve more years before I would reach for the program of Alcoholics Anonymous with the desperation with which the drowning seize life preservers. Beaten into a state of reasonableness, I finally became willing to believe in something greater than myself. Willingness, it turns out, was enough. A wise friend of mine says, "If a door is open just a little bit, the door is open!"

As I said, I am an agnostic. I am still 'without knowledge' of God – but that is what Faith is – belief without knowledge. My belief in something unseen opened the door to Faith. The simple fact is that thousands of generations of people have lived and struggled, survived plagues, famines and wars, droughts and floods, bar room brawls and family reunions – so that I could be here today. Without each of them, there would be no me; they live on in my very DNA. This ancient line of people is a power greater than myself. But I am twice blessed; grateful to that whole anonymous crowd that is responsible for my physical life, and just as grateful to that Anonymous crowd that has given me a spiritual life. I am not alone anymore.

I have come to realize that each and every one of us has our ancient crowd, our history. We are all the beloved children of a Higher Power.



Let Go and Let God

I HAD been sober around six months, and one day my daughter came to a meeting. She said, "I'm going out to visit Mom. I want you to come with me." I had not spoken to my ex-wife in over 20 years. So, I really did not know what to expect.

When we arrived at the house my ex-wife was in the yard working. When she saw me she did not speak to me. She spoke to our daughter, but the words were for me. She screamed. "I don't want to see that man. I don't want to hear anything he has to say. And if he doesn't leave my property, I'll call the police."

I left there very angry, vowing never to return. The memory of our separation and divorce returned. She had been awarded the kids, house, car, furniture and anything else of value. I was locked up in jail, could not appeal in court and received nothing.

When I returned home I called my sponsor. He said, "Just do AA and leave the rest in God's hands." He reminded me that I had made a commitment when I took the Third Step. "Let Go and Let God," he said.

My sponsor got me busy doing service work, chairing meetings, speaking and going on Twelfth Step calls with him. He was also with me as I did Steps Four through Nine.

When I'd been sober around 16 months, my youngest son called. We had talked and written to one another while he was in school, and he had now returned how to stay. He said he wanted to see me; I said OK. We met after a meeting and he said, "We are going out to visit Mom."

I told him what had transpired the last time I had seen his mother. I let him know that I was not going to go through that again. He replied, "It's OK, Dad. I talked to Mom and she said it would be OK."

I said a prayer, we left the clubhouse, and I returned to the home I once owned. I had not been inside the house for over 22 years.

Within a short period of time I found myself alone with my ex in the living room. Then something happened. Instead of an awkward silence, my mouth opened and out came Step Nine. I apologized for my past actions (never mentioning anything she had done). I asked her what I could do to atone for my past behavior.

She said, "Treat your children like a father should. And continue to do whatever it is that you're doing."

On the way home my son said, "Dad, I have prayed for a long time that one day you and Mom would just speak to one another. But I had given up. I knew how Mom was, and you were still drinking. However, When I saw you and Mom talking and laughing I knew it was a miracle and I was filled with a great happiness."

Tears of joy flowed from my eyes. I realized that God had done for me what I could not have done for myself.

Today, I still remember that day. And the countless other days over the past 15 years when all I needed to do was to "Let Go and Let God" work his miracles.



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The group conscience of AA in the U.S. and Canada seems to have agreed upon six points that define an AA group:

1) All members of a group are alcoholics, and all alcoholics are eligible for membership.

2) As a group, they are fully self-supporting.

3) A group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps.

4) As a group, they have no outside affiliation.

5) As a group, they have no opinion on outside issues.

6) As a group, their public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion, and they maintain personal anonymity at the level of press,

A Firm Commitment to Unity

Former Trustee-at-Large Dean R. presented the following talk on Tradition Nine at a 1998 General Sharing Session

IT is impossible to contemplate that AA, as such, ought never be organized, but when we create service boards and committees directly responsible for those they serve, there are really no rules and no laws; services provided are dictated by the needs of others.

The opening line of Tradition Nine, as reflected in the writings of Bill W. in an August 1948 Grapevine editorial, sets forth: "The lease possible organization, that's our universal ideal. No fees, no dues, no rules imposed on anybody."

This statement and definition of Tradition Nine would lead us to believe that AA was operating in anarchy. We all know that is not true. The impossible contradiction works--AA as a whole should never be organized at all. But we proceeded to set up a Conference of recognized and identified areas in 1951 and proceeded to create boards and committees to assist in providing services to alcoholics and AA groups world wide.

It was explained early in my service experience that AA was the most unorganized, organized Fellowship that ever existed, and so it is.

With our informed group conscience, we have throughout the history of AA been able to weather discord and negativism because of our firm commitment to unity, with the underlying knowledge that failure to maintain unity, and pursuing an unsafe course of AA, will lead to its demise and ultimately to the jeopardy of our individual sobriety.

While we do not recognize and have resisted, sometimes violently, the idea of any type of general organization efforts that would hinge on government, we have resolutely and persistently insisted upon organizing special services to assist members of our Fellowship to be more effective and available to carry the message to the still-suffering alcoholic.

The general services that AA provides at the group, district and area level, as well as at the General Service Office, are carried out without authority to order any AA member or group, as they are autonomous.

We make suggestions based on shared experience. We recognize that we cannot dictate to fellow members individually or collectively, and choose not to do so.

AA is truly a society without organization as such; sacrifice is the basis of service, and founded on the spiritual principles, AA is a true Fellowship, with only one purpose--to carry the message of recovery to the alcoholic.

The good will of our Fellowship that we enjoy throughout the world in large measure is directly due to services that we provide through our service structure. May each of us continue to sacrifice in following the spiritual principles and maintaining those principles over personalities and may we continue to carry the spiritual message that was freely given to us so that we may freely pass the AA message on to the suffering alcoholic.
