Not Under the Rug

Step Eight: Made a list of all persons we had harmed and became willing to make amends to them all.

IN approaching Step Eight for the first time, those of us who tend to fight or question various of the Steps until we become convinced they are vital to our sobriety, need reassuring on several points. We may be tempted to tell ourselves that we have done enough housecleaning in the Fourth and Fifth Steps. If we are truthful though, we will have to admit that the biggest obstacle to our taking this Step is that we are *afraid* to face the unpleasant aspects of our past, especially where we have been at fault.

The first part of the Eighth Step is neither difficult to understand nor hard to go through with. As a matter of fact, if we have written out our Fourth Step inventory, we may already have the list of persons we have harmed. However, becoming willing to make amends to them all is another matter. To make amends means to mend or repair, in this case damaged relationships with people, organizations and institutions we have wronged

This Eighth Step is to our relations with others what the Fourth was to our relations with ourselves. And obviously the Ninth and Fifth Steps are similarly related to one another. When I went through with the Fourth Step inventory for the first time, it was with the understanding that I would move on to the Fifth Step as soon as possible. Clearly, I do well to approach this "became willing" part of the Eighth Step with the idea that it feeds directly into the action in Step Nine of going out and making such amends as I can.

Here honesty becomes all important. The quickest way for me to put myself in bad relationship with the Step is to kid myself that I am willing to make an amend if I am not really completely ready. The best method I know of for dealing with unwillingness is this: 1) face it honestly, 2) remember that I have agreed to "go to any lengths to gain victory over alcohol" and 3) ask God to make me willing. This approach works--maybe not in five minutes--but if persisted in, it does work.

Then the question arises of just what constitutes an amend. Many of us find that the old rationalization, "If I stay sober, that's amends enough to those I have hurt," just doesn't work. We have to be willing to go further. Some of the most common amends have to do with: people we owe money; wives, parents, children, relatives and friends we have mistreated; employers, employees and business associates we have harmed; people with whom we have become involved morally in an injurious manner.

This list is only a partial one, but it gives a pretty good general idea of the different types of messes we are dealing with. It is impossible to lay down general rules for handling these various situations. For me, there is no substitute for sitting down with my sponsor and thrashing put each individual case, keeping in mind the intention to do whatever turns out to be necessary to thoroughly and honestly go through with the Step.

In the case of money amends, I didn't have enough money to make them all good at once, but a willingness to pay when and as 1 could, backed up by small monthly installments, did wonders in putting matters right. In the case of family members I had wronged, a sincere apology was often amend enough, although I sometimes found it difficult to become willing to go even this far.

My natural inclination with unpleasant life situations or soured personal relationships is to sweep them under the rug, look the other way, justify myself and hope they will resolve themselves in time. It seems to be a plausible enough approach but, unfortunately, it never worked very well. These wrongs refused to stay forgotten, didn't solve themselves, and even thrived on this treatment to the extent that they drove me back to the first drink again and again.

Facing the people I had hurt and the difficulties I had created seemed impossible, but those who had gone before me on the road to recovery in AA assured me that not only was this method possible but, if followed through, it produced freedom from the guilt, fear, self-pity, resentment and depression which these situations had produced in my life.

I gained faith in the principle which the Eighth Step is about, through experience. When I went through with the process, it did produce the results my sponsor and AA friends said it would.

I'm a guy who used to make god out of what others thought of me. This Step helped free me from a slavish dependence on other people's opinions. It helped teach me the value of placing principles before personalities in my life. It is not a Step that I feel *I have taken*. What I have made is a beginning. As it says in Chapter Five of the Big Book, "We are not saints." I still have character defects, and I still hurt other people (though not as often or seriously as before AA). Each time I become aware of an amend I owe, there is another chance to become willing with God's help to put the principles of the AA program before my fear of personalities (mine or anyone else's).

The wonderful thing about growth on the program is that each time I make a right decision in the area of becoming willing to make an amend it makes the next one a little easier to make. And strangely, I find that the more willing I become to admit it when I am wrong, the less often am I in the position of having to make such an admission. Sure I am still wrong, but only sometimes now—not all the time as I used to be.

TRADITION EIGHT: Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers.

Going on Twelfth Step calls, chairing meetings, sharing my story, doing H&I service, working on special committees for AA events, and doing general service for my home group are all types of service work, but they do not by any means qualify as paying positions. However, AA does hire people to perform certain tasks.

While I do work a full-time job and have a life, the truth is that the time I give to Alcoholics Anonymous is an investment in my sobriety. I do not need to get paid, nor would I want to. To be paid would take away from the humbling and spiritually fulfilling aspect of service that I need to stay sober.

The work I do that's not seen by everyone is definitely the most rewarding, such as when I am sitting at home counting envelopes or preparing my report for my home group. It's especially rewarding when I don't feel like doing it, but I do it anyway. This kind of service helps me to learn accountability, discipline and humility, which I often lack. These traits can't be bought.

We're taught in Alcoholics Anonymous that service will keep us sober. We're also taught that no person should make a sole vocation of such work. I actually look forward to retiring and donating a larger chunk of time to AA and general service work.

Now, how about those paid positions in AA? How about the men and women at the General Service Office (GSO) who answer phones for book orders, or the ones who process the countless letters, articles, questions, comments, updates or donations? These activities may be service, and even though it's for AA, these are jobs.

Truth is, these jobs actually help make my Twelfth Step work a lot easier. When I call GSO as a part of a service commitment, the person on the line is helping me to carry the message, via books and other literature. They also sometimes answer questions and share experiences other groups may have had. But in truth, the work they do at GSO is hard work—and they should get paid.

I don't put in an eight-hour day for AA. Sure, in the course of a week I may put in a few hours, but that's my time. Any person who is putting in a 40-hour week to facilitate the running of AA should be paid. Anyone who puts in time carrying the message and working with others and thinks they should get paid, I will pray for!

- 6. In my own AA life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition?
- 7. Have I paid enough attention to the book Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions? To the pamphlet AA Tradition—How It Developed?



Frequently Asked Questions About A.A. History

O. Who are the recipients of the milestone printing copies of the Big Book?

A. The one-millionth copy was presented to President Richard Nixon in April 1973, and the two-millionth to Joseph Califano, Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, in June 1979. At the 50th Anniversary International Convention in Montréal in 1985, the fivemillionth copy of the Big Book was presented to Ruth Hock, who typed draft after draft of the original manuscript. The ten-millionth was presented to Nell Wing, Bill W.'s longtime (nonalcoholic) secretary and A.A.'s first archivist, in July 1990. The 15-millionth was given to Ellie Norris, widow of former trustee chairman John L. Norris, M.D., in 1996; and in the year 2000, the 20millionth copy was presented to the Al-Anon Family Groups. The 25-millionth copy was presented to Jill Brown, warden of San Quentin Prison, in July 2005, at the A.A. International Convention in Toronto.

Q. Who wrote Chapter 8 of the Big Book, "To Wives"?

A. Bill was the author of the 'To Wives' chapter. It is commonly thought that Lois wrote it. But, as Pass It On describes (page 200), Lois said, "Bill wrote it, and I was mad." She added, "I wasn't so much mad as hurt. I still don't know why Bill wrote it. I've never really gotten into it - why he insisted upon writing it. I said to him, 'Well, do you want me to write it?' And he said no, he thought it should be in the same style as the rest of the book."

G.S.O.'s Archives can provide extensive historical information about A.A.W.S.'s literature and pamphlets: origins; content; editions; printings; changes; and corrections that have been made over time.



Central Office Manager's Report July 21, 2017

June activity at the office was down a little as summer rolls on. We received 497 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 133 calls were for meeting info and 135 were office visitors. Our website stayed busy too. It had 47,274 visits in the last 30 days. And Google reports 4,025 views on our profile.

The semiannual inventory has been completed. There was a \$25.19 adjustment for shrinkage. Most of the adjusted items relieved from inventory were obsolete or outdated material. Total inventory assets were \$24,058.80

The liability certificates of insurance have been sent to additionally insured locations leaseholders. If your group's landlord is requesting a new certificate and they have not yet received it in the mail, give me a call or come by the office and I'll give you a copy for them. Many of the Groups in the East Valley participate in this coverage and we greatly appreciate those who contribute to help offset this cost.

Sad news from World Services – Andrea Brennan, the order fulfillment manager, was a non- alcoholic employee of GSO for 38 years. She was hired by Bill Wilson when she graduated from High School. She retired in December 2016, and recently passed away on June 10th 2017, AA's 85th Birthday! RIP Andrea Brennan.



We also need a Literature Chair and a new editor for the NBN. Please announce!!!



Our co-founder explains why we should question no one's transformation

It is the intention of the Grapevine to carry occasional accounts of spiritual experiences. To this interesting project I would like to say a few introductory words. There is a very natural tendency to set apart those experiences or awakenings, which happen to be sudden, spectacular, or vision-producing. Therefore any recital of such cases always produces mixed reactions. Some will say, "I wish I could have an experience like that!" Others, feeling that this whole business is too far out on the mystic limb for them, or maybe hallucinatory after all, will say, "I just can't buy this business. I can't understand what these people are talking about."

As most AAs have heard, I was the recipient in 1934 of a tremendous mystic experience or "illumination." It was accompanied by a sense of intense white light, by a sudden gift of faith in the goodness of God, and by a profound conviction of his presence. At first it was very natural for me to feel that this experience staked me out for somebody very special.

But as I now look back upon this tremendous event, I can only feel very specially grateful. It now seems clear that the only special feature of my experience was its electric suddenness and the overwhelming and immediate conviction that it carried to me.

In all other respects, however, I am sure that my own experience was not in the least different from that received by every AA member who has strenuously practiced our recovery program.

How often do we sit in AA meetings and hear the speaker declare, "But I haven't yet got the spiritual angle." Prior to this statement, he had described a miracle of transformation which had occurred in him— not only his release from alcohol, but a complete change in his whole attitude toward life and the living of it. It is apparent to nearly everyone else present that he has received a great gift; and that this gift was all out of proportion to anything that might be expected from simple AA activity, such as the admission of alcoholism and the practice of Step Twelve. So we in the audience smile and say to ourselves, "Well, that guy is just reeking with the spiritual angle—except that he doesn't seem to know it yet!" We well know that this questioning individual will tell us six months or a year hence that he has found faith in God.

Moreover, he may by then be displaying "spiritual qualities" and a performance that I myself have never been able to duplicate—my sudden spiritual experience notwithstanding.

So nowadays when AAs come to me, hoping to find out how one comes by those sudden experiences, I simply tell them that in all probability they have had one just as good—and that theirs is identical excepting it has been strung out over a longer period of time.

Then I go on to say that if their transformation in AA extending over six months had been condensed into six minutes—well, they then might have seen the stars, too!

In consequence of these observations I fail to see any great difference between the sudden experiences and the more gradual ones—they are certainly all of the same piece. And there is one sure test of them all: "By their fruits, ye shall know them."

This is why I think we should question no one's transformation—whether it be sudden or gradual. Nor should we demand anyone's special type for ourselves, because our own experience suggests that we are apt to receive whatever may be the most useful for our needs.
