A letter from Inside Looking Out

Following is a letter from a local AA member residing in prison.*

Dear No Booze News,

Our group would like to say thank-you to all of the East Valley Intergroup for all the support and for keeping us in your thoughts and prayers. We are all so grateful to have you.

As for me, I am Jerry P. I have been a friend of Bill W. for 24 years. Mostly here in prison. I have been working the AA program, helping set up meetings, chairing, working with others, both staff and inmates alike. I feel it is important for AA in the Department of Corrections as it gives us as inmates a place we can go to talk out our problems with alcohol and to be able to talk open and freely with others who, like most of us, have had problems with substance abuse.

AA gives us that, behind these walls and fences. I started my first group inside in 1993. The Inside Looking Out Group started in July of 2011 with the help of a C.O. who used to be here. We have as many as 24+ inmates in our weekly meetings.

While I was at another facility I chaired meetings along with my sponsor. Together we started the chip program. With a lot of help from the Chaplain and my Higher Power and my sponsor we were allowed to carry them as they are a part of policy. You meet a lot of staff here who believe in Bill W. Words cannot express the glow that comes over some of these guys' faces when they stand before the group to get that little round token of achievement.

Most people would think drugs or booze wouldn't be a problem in prison. Trust me, booze and drugs know no boundaries. It goes where it wants, prison included. At least the Inside Looking Out Group gives these men a chance and a place to change their lives. We offer that by having books, newsletters and pamphlets as well as sponsors from the streets help to guide us in our AA way of life. We thank God for them as well as East Valley for the support. I want to thank everyone who has had a hand in our program here for all their time, dedication, patience and effort for the joy I receive for being sober.

The Tenth Step is the teen years of the Steps for me. This Step makes me start acting like an adult or make my amends. For me, it is about **honesty, humility, courage** and **acceptance**.

Honesty is something I had to learn. I am still learning how to be completely honest. In "how it works," it talks a little about honesty. I needed to grasp and develop a manner of living that demands rigorous honesty. I learned how to look at my actions with honesty: Did I do my best? Were my actions based on fear, anger or love? Am I looking at my actions, and not just my intentions? Am I telling the whole story or just the parts I want others to hear? And at the end of the day, I ask my-self: Did I do what I said I would do?

Humility teaches me that there are other people here besides me. I'm not always first or last; sometimes others get the job, the girl, or whatever it is sometimes. With humility, I can learn what my strengths and weaknesses are and what I'm good at and what I need to work on. I'm no better or worse than anyone else. I've learned that there is no "us or them," nor "me or you." There is only "we." We are all just trying to get through this life as best we can.

I have to remember to pray for courage to do the things I need to do and to do God's will. I need to pray for the courage to change my actions when I'm having problems with people, places and things. And courage to look at my part in a problem and make my amends. I ask for the courage to do the mundane things in life I need to do but don't want to. And the courage to do things to improve my life. Lastly, I pray for the courage to say I'm wrong.

Acceptance has a big learning curve for me. I try not to waste so much time trying to changing things that aren't mine to change. Acceptance for me is that I'm the one who needs to change in accordance with people, places and things.



September 15, 2017

August just seemed to fly by. I guess a vacation will do that. The office stayed busy in August, even with the heat. We received 536 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 137 calls were for meeting info and 155 were office visitors. 9,032 people found us on Google, of those 268 either visited our website or got directions to the office. Our website stayed busy too. It had 42,185 visits in the last 30 days.

We spoke to the Houston Intergroup Office on the Monday after Harvey made landfall. They had been receiving many calls from people wanting to send books and/or money. On Tuesday they enabled their website to accept contributions. On Thursday they replaced the contribution button with a notice saying that their needs had been met and thanking everyone for their generosity.

I will be attending the ICOAA (Intergroup, Central Office, AAWS and AAGV) seminar in Northern Virginia September 4th to the 8th. I will also be presenting a bid to bring this seminar to our area in 2019. It will be a lot of fun and a little work but I'm confident that our local members will come together host a great event for our out of town family.

What's an AA Group?

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The group conscience of AA in the U.S. and Canada seems to have agreed upon six points that define an AA group:

- 1) All members of a group are alcoholics, and all alcoholics are eligible for membership.
- 2) As a group, they are fully self-supporting.
- 3) A group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps.
- 4) As a group, they have no outside affiliation.
- 5) As a group, they have no opinion on outside issues.
- 6) As a group, their public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion, and they maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, TV, and film.

Tradition Ten

A.A .has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy.

Many years ago, a nonalcoholic friend of AA who was one of our Class A trustees referred to Alcoholics Anonymous as "an island of sanity in a world gone mad." How true! And to keep it that way, we are guided by Tradition Ten.

Yet I'm convinced that what goes on in the world around us does indeed affect AA in various ways--for example, the smoking/nonsmoking controversy, local drunk-driving laws, liability insurance requirements. Nonsmoking meetings are frequently mandated by someone or something other than the group conscience. Drunk-driving laws result in forced rather than voluntary attendance at AA meetings, and while we don't check up on our own members, we sign proof of attendance slips in the spirit of cooperation with the courts or other agencies associated with them.

Other current issues are more subtle. At a recent AA service event, I heard comments on introduction/identification ("I'm John/I'm an alcoholic"). According to some, this is a comparatively new custom (although this was in practice when I came to AA, eighteen years ago). The custom of closing meetings with the Lord's Prayer almost always comes up at such gatherings, but is now extended to holding hands and getting into a circle (which was *not*done when I came around).

A long time ago, our co-founder Dr. Bob warned: "Let's not louse it all up with Freudian complexes and things that are interesting to the scientific mind, but have little to do with our actual AA work." Could he be referring to such expressions as "dysfunctional family" or "low self-esteem" which have crept into AA lingo in recent years? Not too long ago, I sponsored a young woman who felt like drinking all the time and consistently complained she was "not feeling good about herself." In frustration, I suggested that she might just as well drink rather than feel that bad all the time. I'd never, ever said that to anyone! She did drink but came back a few months later and has been sober ever since.

Last year, I attended a district-sponsored public information meeting, where a renowned clergy-man/psychiatrist very active in the treatment of addictions spoke. He expressed concern that the main goal of society today is to "feel good." In contrast, the goal of fellowships such as Alcoholics Anonymous is to "do good." And by concentrating on "doing good," people discover that they "feel good." He expressed his hope that the rest of society would learn this too.

We cannot--and should not--isolate ourselves from the world around us. Consequently, outside issues are bound to creep into our rooms. What we do about this--as individuals and as groups--depends on how well we learn about and apply--nay, live--the principles set down for us in *all* of our Twelve Traditions.
