It seems to me that meditating every morning on the many benefits I have received helps me through the day. When I was drinking, I used to spend that same time in the mornings over my coffee meditating, but in such a different way--wondering first how I'd get through the day, second how many people at work would notice that I was again showing up with bleary eyes, and finally concluding that it was none of their damned business and so going to work with a chip on my shoulder.

Now I spend those same moments just being glad that again I'm starting the day with a clear head--that, while there is much for me to do to better myself that I *am* trying to do something about myself; in short, just starting the day in the right frame of mind.

Circling the Wagons - Staying sober during the holidays

I am reminded so vividly of how it was for me in the fall of 1987, when I joined our Fellowship. I got sober in Los Angeles with a bunch of hard-line AAs. These folks carried their Big Books with them. After a meeting they would go out for coffee and talk about the program. They told me the things I needed to hear, especially: "Do the Steps or die." That got through to me.

That fall, just before the holidays, billboards started going up all over town advertising every kind of booze there is. You know what they look like--there's guy in a tuxedo, a blonde girl in a black dress slit up to here

My keen alcoholic mind saw the billboards and I immediately wanted to be the quy in the tux. Because I was more accustomed to failing than succeeding, I told myself I couldn't possibly stay sober under the pressure of all this advertising and that I would surely start drinking before a very long time passed.


I hadn't learned much in the short time I'd been sober, but I knew enough to share this concern at a meeting. I told them I might as well start drinking now; I could always get sober again after the holidays had passed.

After the meeting, a group formed around me--circling the wagons.

Everyone had advice based on his or her own experience in a like situation. What stood out for me was: "Come to a lot of meetings. The club is one place where you absolutely cannot get a drink. Meetings, fellowship, laughter, debates--but no one will offer you a drink."

I took the advice and showed up for a lot of meetings, and I made it through that first holiday season without taking a drink. And I've made it my own personal tradition to show up at an AA meeting on all of those holidays, and a few others, ever since then.



Central Office Manager's Report October 20, 2017

We received 508 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 128 calls were for meeting info, 141 were office visitors and 10 resulted in a 12 step calls. Our Google listing also receives steady traffic. Our Google totals for August were 8,591 views, 182 went to our website and 17 called.

Check out the cover story on the current issue of Box 459 (the quarterly newsletter from GSO). The 4 page article "Intergroup/Central Office: Then and Now" is terrific. It discusses the importance of service offices and local Intergroups in the past, present and future. There are more copies available at the office.

I attended the ICOAA (Intergroup, Central Office, AAWS and AAGV) seminar in Northern Virginia September 4th to the 8th. Seminar Report Part I: Richard Purtell – Class B Trustee; AA World Services, Chair reports that GSO receives 90,000 pieces of correspondence a year, all of which are answered. Literature sales are up for 2017. In 2015 66% of all services were paid for by contributions, that number is now at 85%. There is no literature price increase in the foreseeable future. GSO has seen a 10% increase in contributions and a 5% decrease in expenses in the last year.

I spoke with the Houston Intergroup Office manager at the seminar. They had received more literature and funds for hurricane relief than they could use. So in the spirit of "passing it on" they are getting in touch with the Puerto Rico Central Office to send it to them.

Hope everyone has a great time at the Day of Service. Service opportunities are available on all EVI committees and the 12th step list. Please take some Gratitude with Service forms back to your group and encourage the members to volunteer. The life you save may be your own.

I was the general manager of the universe. At least that was my self-proclaimed title. I didn't realize that was what I was acting like, but everyone else did. If you didn't take my advice I'd get really upset and some form of my wrath would descend upon you. And all that time I was being so nice (I thought). I've been humbled many times in sobriety. I once lost a job because I had not provided the proper paperwork (in the medical profession, that's illegal). I've been told, "Rozanne, it's not called Rozanne Anonymous, stop trying to change everything to be about you." I've had sponsees come and go, teaching me about the magic of AA: It's not about me.

How am I carrying the message to other alcoholics? Am I doing everything I can? Does the woman sitting beside me at work have a problem? Can I be an example of the Big Book to her?

Today, 20 years after giving up that general manager position, I am still continually reminded that I must give it away to keep it. I must remember, every day, that my main purpose in life is to stay sober and help others.

Life is good. The other day, I was having lunch with a coworker and she asked me how I could be so happy all the time? I pointed to the heavens. I said nothing. I just pointed and smiled.

Lois explained the sites could be detailed down to number of employee's managed, etc. It is hard to find exact match. Pat asked if Office Manager receives the money from line item- Employee Medical; Lois explained we provide medical insurance and the line item is the premium we pay.

More Than A Cake

A few months ago, I began attending a Big Book Step meeting on Thursday evenings. This group had a lot of sobriety to share. The meeting ran like a well-oiled machine. Everyone was greeted upon arrival, the meeting started on time, announcements were made, chips were handed out and the meeting began. There was fresh coffee and treats at the back of the room. On the last Thursday of each month, members brought a cake to celebrate the AA anniversaries for that month. As a newcomer to this meeting and being somewhat shy, I did what I usually do. I tried to remain as unnoticed as possible while still soaking up as much wisdom in the room as I could.

One of the first people to greet me was a man in his 40s. Robert was bald and very thin. He had a spark of mischievousness and kindness about him. I liked him immediately. He was obviously well-liked by the group and he had a number of sponsees who seemed to have a lot of fun in recovery. I soon learned that Robert had stage-four cancer. I also found out that he was approaching his 16th AA anniversary in November. He had been the one to hand me my 6-year chip at the meeting.

One Thursday early in November, I was at the grocery store. When I was at the checkout counter, the store manager asked me if I wanted a free cake. The store was giving away an assortment of beautifully decorated cakes and he instructed me to pick one. My first thought was that I didn't need a cake at my house. I lived alone and was counting calories. Then I heard that inner voice telling me to take a cake to the meeting that night and to give it to Robert. Something told me to take the carrot cake (I would have chosen something with chocolate).

Standing there at the counter, I began to have an inner argument. My thoughts were running. I told myself, I can't do that. It's not the last meeting of the month. Surely, someone else must be assigned to bring a bigger cake for everyone. Robert will think I'm lame, or worse, that I have a crush on him. Others will wonder why they didn't get their own cake. That's not how it's done. But the thought that I should take the cake wouldn't leave me. So I thanked the manager and took the carrot cake home along with the rest of my groceries.

At one point, I actually put the cake in the freezer, thinking I would just take it to some other unforeseen future event. I was still wrestling with my thoughts, thinking it was a dumb idea. Yet I wasn't finding any peace with any idea other than taking the cake to Robert. I took the cake back out of the freezer. When it was time to leave for the meeting, I reluctantly brought the cake with me. I walked into the meeting and marched straight over to Robert, whose actual anniversary date was that very day. I felt embarrassed as I handed him the carrot cake and wished him a "sweet 16."

"How did you know that this was my favorite cake?" Robert asked. "Um, I didn't," I replied.

The last meeting of the month, where the group cake would have been served, was cancelled because the meeting room at a church was being used for a Thanksgiving event. Then, early in December, Robert contracted pneumonia and passed away suddenly, surrounded by his closest AA friends and family.

Recently, I heard an old-timer share in a meeting that "once you've completed the Twelve Steps, you need to start listening to that inner voice." I'm grateful that I listened to that inner voice that day at the grocery store. How did I know that carrot cake was Robert's favorite or that this would be the last chance for the AA group that he loved to celebrate with a cake just for him before he died?

I didn't know any of that. But I have a Higher Power who must have wanted Robert to feel special. I hope that I can learn to listen to that inner voice without such a battle next time, even when it doesn't make sense to me. I hope to get to the place where I can trust that even though I may not know the outcome, my Higher Power does.
