Best Part of the Evening

Just four days shy of 30 days sober, I turned 28. While I had already experienced a couple of miracles from the program (I went to a NFL game without drinking!), I was dreading having a birthday without booze. Would it even be any fun?

I hadn't celebrated a birthday that didn't end in a blackout in more than a decade. I remember the first time I met my sponsor to do Step work. I told her I was worried about staying sober on my birthday.

"Oh, is today your birthday?" she said. I told her it wasn't. "Then no need to worry about it now," she said. "God lives in today and that's where we'll stay."

She also told me to train my brain to "think of God instead" when any worries of my birthday (or any feelings of anxiety for that matter) popped up into my head. My spiritual toolkit had just received one of its very first tools.

My first sober "belly-button birthday" (as you guys called it) fell on a Tuesday night. I only remember it was on a Tuesday because I had to miss my home group meeting to go to my parents' house for dinner.

Mind you, I had avoided my family all summer long because I had been arrested for DUI in June. I was so overcome with shame and guilt that my favorite coping skill—avoidance—kept me in hiding. When I was drinking, I was so loaded all the time that I'm not even sure I called home on birthdays, let alone tried to see my parents. With the newfound freedom from starting the Steps (I was about to begin my Fourth Step), what better time than my birthday to let my parents know that I had a progressively fatal disease? My timing may not have been impeccable but I do know that God's always is.

I was terrified to say out loud to my parents that I was indeed an alcoholic. I knew once I admitted it to them, I would be reaching a point of no return. I just had to stay sober once they knew my secret. There was something in sharing that secret that made my alcoholism feel more real.

Taking the advice of my sponsor, I prayed that God would "give me the words and speak for me." I also prayed for the courage to be open and honest. I couldn't focus on the outcome. I had to trust God that my sharing of this news with my parents wouldn't stop the world from turning.

Shockingly, the whole conversation went smoothly. Of course, there were tears, but they were tears of love and support. I was able to say to them that being arrested was the greatest gift that God had ever given me. I told them that it had catapulted me into a life beyond my wildest dreams and given me freedom.

The highlight of the evening, however, was not the admission of my alcoholism to my parents. While that was a very liberating experience, it was still uncomfortable. The real highlight was going to the "meeting after the meeting" at the coffee shop across the street from my home group.

My sponsor had made sure that I had a sober place to celebrate my first belly-button birthday in sobriety once I was finished at my parents' house. She invited her other sponsees and women from the home group to show me that we never have to walk through anything alone. They sang "Happy Birthday" to me with a little cake on the patio.

While I was overwhelmed at the time by all the unconditional love and attention, I am brought to tears today to think of the selfless gift those women gave me. They showed up for me and they didn't even know me. They loved me before I was able to love myself. They stayed out late to make sure I was going to be OK and show me that there is such a thing as having fun without drinking.

The gift of fellowship that those courageous and kind women gave to me that night helped me get through one of my very first "firsts" in sobriety. I'm eternally grateful to them, and have had the honor of being able to pass on the love to help other newcomers celebrate some of their very first "firsts" too.



Robert: "No, I don't drink anymore."



There are three chapters at the end of the AA Big Book that aren't talked about a whole lot in meetings. "To Wives" is the chapter dedicated to the spouse of the alcoholic. "To Employers" is dedicated to the employer of an alcoholic. "The Family Afterward" deals with the people that are closest to the alcoholic, not only witnessing the destructiveness of the disease but also feeling the impact on a regular basis.

All these chapters are there and meant to be read by these individuals. But they are also meant for me to read so that I can gain a better understanding of how the people around me might behave as I recover.

I love these three chapters because, although they do not address step-work specifically, they offer expectations and suggestions on how everyone that feels the ripple effect of alcoholism can respond in a healthier way. This was a tremendous gift that was offered by the authors of this book. Recovery is hard enough, so visibility to the whole landscape, some perspective on how to behave, some understanding to how other people might behave, this is critical to helping me reintegrate with the world.

The Big Book authors offer three main expectations in the third paragraph on page 122:

Cessation from drinking is but the first step away from a highly strained, abnormal condition.

Right out of the gate the authors explain that stopping drinking will not fix everything.

A Doctor said to us, "Years of living with an alcoholic is almost sure to make any wife or child neurotic. The entire family is, to some extent, ill."

So secondly, it is explained that, not only is the alcoholic sick, the family is sick too.

Let families realize, as they start their journey, that all will not be fair weather.

Lastly, we are given the assurance that this is not going to be easy.

As the chapter continues, we are given the gift of hope at the top of page 123:

Suppose we tell you some of the obstacles a family will meet; suppose we suggest how they may be avoided – even converted to good use for others.

And that is exactly what we get. The remaining twelve pages of the chapter are entirely dedicated to what may (and probably will) happen with the family of the alcoholic recovers. The Big Book authors really haven't missed a thing. When it comes to answering life's problems, all the bases are covered in the first 164 pages. I've yet to find something I cannot solve in the contents of this book. In my opinion, something that flawless must come from something beyond human intellect.

My family is and continues to be restored as I continue with the program of alcoholics anonymous. When I first tried to get sober, I specifically recall trying to get sober for them. I did not stop drinking. It wasn't until I finally got sober when I realized that my sobriety has nothing to do with my family.

Heaven forbid my family is taken suddenly, I am still here with my sobriety. My sobriety is mine and mine alone, it is my responsibility. I own my work to connect with a Higher Power. My family is a result of the work I do in this program. When I do well I tend to be present for my family in the right way, of service, living out my amends daily. When things aren't going well, they are typically the first ones to notice.

The last sentence of the first paragraph on page 135 sums it up:

Seeing is believing for most families who have lived with a drinker.

If I don't get this confused with trying to prove myself to them, then I will be okay. If I just do the step-work I am aligned with my HP and my family notices the way they were meant to notice.

First Things First. Live and Let Live. Easy Does It.
