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# The Right Combination

She made a deal with her Higher Power, and her sobriety finally clicked.

From the October 2002 Grapevine.

I grew up in an alcoholic family. Life was unpredictable and, at times, volatile. I learned at a very young age that if I acted a certain way, I wouldn't get into trouble. It was a difficult combination to figure out. Sometimes my father would be jovial, and I could let down my guard. But most of the time, I had to figure out how to be invisible.

I used the same strategy throughout school. I tried to get the right combination of doing as little homework as possible while still getting good grades. I also tried to figure out the right combination

for fitting in socially. That's when alcohol came into my life.

One night, I snuck some vodka out of my parents' liquor cabinet. It was the first time I ever drank, and I had a blackout. I woke up the next morning in my bed with vomit all over me. I had thrown up on myself while sitting in my father's favorite chair. If I had been lying down, I could have drowned. Obviously that was the wrong combination.

For the next twenty-three years, I attempted to get the right combination of alcohol into my system, so I could feel comfortable in my own skin. A few times I was able to find it, but not often. I used to pride myself in saying that I'd had only one blackout. Now, I realize that I'd had hundreds of "pass outs."

I had been institutionalized two times in four years. At the last treatment center, I was told I was an alcoholic. But once again, I thought I had the right combination: I was educated and well-informed about the disease and knew I would never become one, for I knew what to do when it got bad--again.

When I finally decided I had had enough, I came into the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous. I thought I knew what I had to do to

stay sober. Again, I thought I had the right combination. I was miserable. Sure, I went to meetings once or twice a week, and I had a sponsor whom I called when I had time. And I did pray, when I was in a real jam. I don't know how I stayed sober the first two years.

I was ready to commit suicide. I didn't know what to do. So I asked my Higher Power for help. I bought a meeting book and discovered there was a meeting five minutes away that met daily. I made a deal with my Higher Power and committed myself to go to a meeting every day. It helped; it really did. I started praying every day. Then I started reading the Big Book and the "Twelve and Twelve." I started to call my sponsor even when there was no crisis in my life. I worked the Steps. I became involved in the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous. I started sponsoring people. So far, the combination of not drinking, going to meetings, asking for help, praying and meditating, doing service, working with others, and reading AA materials (including the Grapevine), has worked for me. I look back now with gratitude for the people who were there for me in my best and worst times. I think I have a great combination that works for me. **-- Leslie J. W.Scottsdale, Arizona** 

# A novel approach

#### From the October 2003 Grapevine.

One day, I was reading a spy novel in which the main character was an alcoholic, though he never admitted it. (This was when I was still drinking, after completing four treatment programs and attending hundreds of AA meetings.) I could see how his drinking affected his behavior, and it occurred to me that I could get a better look at my own alcoholic behavior if I wrote a novel about a character with my character defects.

So I studied the art of writing fiction in earnest and began writing my first novel, formulating a plot in which the main character enters a treatment program after an intervention. I completed the first draft-- a hefty tome of 700 pages--in four years and sent it to an editor for evaluation. The multipage response encouraged me, but also pointed out many glaring deficiencies. After four more years of rewriting, I sent the novel to another editor. This time the evaluation was even more encouraging, but revealed deficiencies that could be corrected only by clear thinking. I knew what I had to do. I stopped drinking, made the necessary revisions, and published it. I have been clean and sober for the past two years and nine months, and am well into a sequel. **-- Frederick W. Sun Lakes, Arizona**

# Central Office Manager's Report September 20, 2019

We received 533 requests for information and assistance in August. Of those 137 calls were for meeting info, 159 were office visitors and 9 resulted in a good old fashioned 12 step call. Google reported 9,377 viewed our info page. Of those, 36 got directions to the office, 35 called and 246 went to our website. Our website stays busy too. It had 55,624 visits in the last 30 days.

2020 Detroit online registration is now open. Registration is \$115 per person, \$140 after April 15, 2020. There is still housing available. Go to aa.org for more details.

There is an update available for the Meeting Guide app. It has an improved user interface, greater search capabilities, access to local contacts and Daily Reflections. The Meeting Guide is a free app licensed by Alcoholics Anonymous to help people find meetings and contacts near them.

Please discuss with your group the service opportunities that are available thru your East Valley Intergroup. Answer the A.A. hotline, go on an old fashioned 12 step call, take a meeting to a home bound member, share information about A.A. with the public and professional community, help put on an event, print and fold directories and newsletters or take a shift at the office. # Who's Responsible?

From the October 1980 Grapevine.

THE TIME was 7:30 PM; the date, August 27, 1969.I was sitting on a barstool waiting for a cab to take me to meet a guy who was to take me to my first AA meeting. That evening was the end of a five-week drunk, which was the end of a thirty-year drinking career. What had happened on that day to give me the one requirement for acceptance of this program of AA--a sincere desire to quit drinking--I do not know. Today, I give credit to a loving God as I understand Him.

When I got out of the cab, there was the guy to take me to my first meeting. I had been wearing the same clothes for a long time, and had been drunk for a long time, and had smelled for a long time; my problem was obvious. Eddie did not hesitate or ask any questions as he loaded me into his car and took me to the meeting. For that, I am grateful.

For the next ninety days or so, Eddie was always there to take me to a meeting. I was scared, shaking, sometimes angry; but it didn't bother him. I learned a lesson from him that I used for many years: No matter how sick or shaky a man may be, take him to a meeting.

I took a lot of drunks to meetings, because that's how I was treated when I came in. Several years ago, there started a trend that continues today. A large percentage of people coming into AA come from treatment centers, hospitals, rehab houses, etc. How they get here is not important; whether they stay is. Coming here from various facilities, to my way of thinking, has several disadvantages. They miss the one -to-one concept of one drunk helping another, which is how AA started, how it grew, and how it will survive. And they sometimes miss being taken by the hand and led through fellowship, meetings, and coffee afterward, to learn to share with one another.

Twelfth-stepping is a vital part of AA's program. Where does the responsibility lie? With the treatment center? With the intergroup? With the group? Or does the responsibility fall directly in my lap? I was twelfth-stepped into AA, many of my friends were.

The treatment centers do not twelfth-step, nor do they show people how. Are we old-timers passing the buck? I am guilty of this. I feel that, as an AA member and as a sponsor, I should share the experience of twelfth-stepping with the people I sponsor. How else are they going to acquire the knowledge, experience, and desire to twelfth-step on their own? I feel this is the time to get back to the basics of the program work the fundamentals that have been successful in the past will continue to work if we use them.
