The Fear of a Moral Inventory

Those Tormenting Ghosts of Yesterday By Rick R. (49 yrs sober)

Over the years, I have watched the differing patterns of A.A. members and the degree of the importance of Thoroughness applied to the steps as opposed to simply abstaining from alcohol. With all the empathy and compassion in my heart I try to be available to everyone with an explanation of what I perceive to be the biggest *Stumbling Block* that stands in the way of the unfortunate ones that never seem to reach the degree of *Happiness and Peace of Mind* that the program offers.

When I am approached by someone who is struggling with this issue my first question would be," Have you completed a thorough Fourth and Fifth step?" And if they are honest about it, we have a chance to revisit that part of the program and Neutralize those Tormenting Ghosts of Yesterday. I was that guy in my first attempt at taking the steps and rather than dealing with it, I just went to meetings and told funny stories until an event in my life caused me to take a second look at the inventory process. I'm so glad that I got it right the second time around, for if I hadn't, I can see no possible way that I could have followed up with the remaining steps of the program.

Most alcoholics are not proud of their past behaviors and live in a constant state of guilt and shame. They believe that they were responsible for those behaviors and that is where the alcohol became the solu-

tion to their problem until it stopped working. There is a difference between Responsibility and Accountability. Most alcoholics believe that they are responsible for becoming an alcoholic and that is the Biggest Misconception concerning this subject, unless, at childbirth, you had the capacity to understand alcoholism and the ability to decide that you wanted to become one.

From the day we were born, until we took our first drink, we were conditioned to the degree that alcohol affected us differently than it did for the normal person. Our minds were diseased, and we had no choice in the matter. The behaviors that followed were the symptoms of the disease. Once we are aware of this perception and become willing to be accountable for those behaviors and make restitution for wrongs done, who could fault us for that?

As we continue the steps of the program, we start by recognizing the old alcoholic habits and they are not too hard to change. We seem to begin that process as soon as we start attending meetings and hear others share their experience, we deal with the obvious things upfront and if we continue to examine our motives, for the things we do, in time the load gets lighter and lighter.

Now comes the Stumbling Blocks I referred to earlier; Those Tormenting Ghosts of Yesterday. *There is a big difference between a Habit and a Deed.* Habits can be changed, in time, as we establish a new track record and we become an entirely different person in character. Deeds are a different matter. *We can't change history.* I'm sure that we all have done things that we would hope that they remain a secret forever, but when they measure up to the term "Tormenting Ghosts" we need to deal with them if we wish to have some degree of Happiness and Peace of Mind.

We can't change our history but we can change our Perception of those deeds as *Symptoms of the disease of Alcoholism* and were part of the conditioning and often things that happened even before we ever took a drink and as painful as they may be, if we spend the rest of our lives living by those unselfish principles and habits, over a period of time, our actions will far outweigh our guilt and shame. We only live once and nobody's perfect. It would be a shame to let something that happened years ago keep us in pain as a result of a symptom of a disease. They are not what we Perceived them to be and we can bring them to a natural conclusion.





Central Office Manager's Report March 15th, 2019

We received 461 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 119 calls were for meeting info, 142 were office visitors and 14 resulted in a 12 step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 48,381 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google listing also receives steady traffic. Our Google totals for February were 11,393 views. Of those 359 went to our website, 65 requested directions and 45 gave us a call.

Literature sales have been a bit above normal so far this year. We have been placing 2 literature orders a month to maintain appropriate stock levels. Our City of Mesa business permit has been renewed as well as our bulk postage permit.

Telling the Truth About Ourselves

From the January 1997 Grapevine

Letting newcomers know what AA is all about

Some time back, I had the opportunity to chair a meeting in which two old-timers spoke. They told about how conditions were for the alcoholic when they got sober. In those days, they said, alcoholics couldn't find many needed services such as medical care, psychiatric care, etc. These old-timers shared with us how they had worked very hard to change that picture and carry the AA message to the professionals of their time.

Eventually, hospitals were opened up to alcoholics, and psychiatrists were willing to work with those who needed their services. All this was due to the diligent efforts of those early AAs.

As I listened to these old-timers, it dawned on me that these folks had worked hard to build a trust between the professionals and the AAs who would bring potential members to them for their care. How hard they worked was not, however, the key to this new understanding. What became apparent was that their intent was not for the professional to provide a means to sobriety. Rather they had attempted to provide a climate in which the alcoholic could receive those types of services that AA did not provide.

If that is the case, then why do we seem to have this ongoing problem with those referred to us from treatment centers? Perhaps it's because we became lazy. In our area, it appears that as the professionals labored in the fields of medicine, psychiatry, and religion, we turned more and more of the care of the newcomer over to the professional.

When many of our early AAs became "alcoholism professionals," this tended to solidify the idea that only the "best" could work with new people. When the new people came into the meetings and were heard to say "My counselor said. . . ," nobody challenged the statement. I have, on occasion, checked out these alleged pearls of truth. The counselor was often as appalled by the statement, reported to be theirs, as was the AA group. It seems that the new people, rather than changing to fit the AA program, were changing the program to suit themselves.

The problem, however, is not the newcomer. The major problem is in what we want from, and do for, the newcomer. We want them to like us and to get sober with us. Quite frankly, that is none of our business! Our responsibility is to tell the newcomer the truth about ourselves and our experience with the AA program. This, of course, includes where we failed as well as where we have succeeded. The choice to get sober, go insane, or die is clearly theirs. Our job is to provide them with facts upon which a choice can be made.

The Big Book says, in a couple of places, that "we lay the kit of spiritual tools before them." It doesn't say that we beat them about the head and face with it, nor does it suggest that we surgically implant it, or even that we carefully stuff it in their pocket.

It is, I believe, an act of humility to bend down and place a "kit of spiritual tools" at a person's feet. That's our job! It is an act of dignity to bend down and pick up the "kit of spiritual tools" which has been placed in front of one's feet. That's their job! We need to be humble, they need to begin to act with dignity. It is through the simple act of telling newcomers the truth about ourselves, and the AA program, that this can take place.

Of course, in order to do this we will need to be clear about what we do in AA and what we don't do. We will require, of ourselves, the explanation that we discuss alcoholism and our recovery from it through AA's Twelve Steps and that is all.

We don't need to change the treatment centers, the newcomers, the courts, or any other agency which refers people to Alcoholics Anonymous. We need only to change how we go about informing those who are referred

to us. As we do this, those who come to us will learn very early what we have to offer, and where their best help may be found. As we do this, we will come to a greater understanding of what our program is and what it can do. In our Big Book it clearly states that we don't apologize for our approach to recovery from alcoholism, nor do we have the only approach. We simply have one tried-and-true method that our experience shows works.
