The Lost Navajo

He had to find himself all over again in jail.

From the July 2002 Grapevine

My name is Leonard F., and I am a Navajo Indian. I was raised by my grandmother on the Navajo Reservation. I lost my mother to alcohol, so I never got to know her or what she looked like.

I took my first drink of alcohol when I was about twelve years old, and after that first drink, I became an alcoholic. I

don't remember what I did. All I remember is my grandmother getting mad at me.

I started school on the reservation but never finished. I took alcohol with me when I went to school and it got me kicked out.

When my grandmother passed on, my drinking got worse. Alcohol was like water to me. It made me a monster. I couldn't stop drinking. I didn't know who I was or why I was put here on Mother Earth. I was a lost Navajo on the reservation; I didn't know where to turn for help, and I turned away from everyone who loved me.

So I thought to myself, "I have to get off the reservation and get a job somewhere." I started working in Utah. I ran away from alcohol, trying to hide from it. But it caught up with me. Even at work, I had a bottle of alcohol in my hand.

When I went home again and met a lady, I thought I had gotten away from alcohol. She became my girlfriend, but the alcohol stayed with me. She told me to stop drinking, but I didn't want to. Alcohol became my girlfriend instead of her.

Then I got into trouble with the law. That is when my life started to come back to me. Jail is where I had to find myself all over again. At first, I didn't want to know who I was. But when I went to AA in jail, I started putting myself back together. Now when I look back at my life, I ask, "What did alcohol give me?" Nothing. "What has sobriety given me?" Everything.

Akot' éego. (And this is my story.) Thank you, AA.

When ready, we say something like this: "My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen." We have then completed Step Seven.

Now we need more action, without which we find that "Faith without works is dead." Let's look at Steps Eight and Nine. We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we took inventory. We subjected ourselves to a drastic self-appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol.



Central Office Manager's Report June 21, 2019

May activity at the office was on par for this time of year. We received 513 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 151 calls were for meeting info and 145 were office visitors. Our website stayed busy too. It had 54,443 visits in the last 30 days. And Google reports 9,828 views on our profile, 319 visited our website, 37 gave us a call and 48 asked for directions.

The semiannual inventory has been completed. There was a \$69.95 adjustment for shrinkage. Most of the adjusted items relieved from inventory were obsolete or outdated. Total inventory assets were \$23,924.06.

The liability and WC insurance will renew at the end of June. Our agent will send updated certificates of insurance to additionally insured locations leaseholders. Many of the Groups in the East Valley participate in this coverage and we greatly appreciate those who contribute to help offset this cost.

Please discuss with your group the service opportunities that are available thru your East Valley Intergroup. Answer the A.A. hotline, go on an old fashioned 12 step call, take a meeting to a home bound member, share information about A.A. with the public and professional community, help put on an event, print and fold directories and newsletters or take a shift at the office. These are just a few of the services we provide and it takes hundreds of volunteers. Please take some Gratitude with Service forms back to your group and encourage them to volunteer. To Lift his Spirits

After an AA mom's son lands in jail for drunken driving, she learns to stay sober and let go

From the July 2014 Grapevine

After many years of living as a dry drunk, I found my way back into the rooms of AA. I had been working the program vigilantly for almost a year and a half when my sobriety was tested in ways I never imagined. My brother was diagnosed with cancer, and two days later our father, who had been ill for many years, committed suicide. The final blow came eight weeks later when my only child was sentenced to two years in prison for another DUI. In my grief and pain I couldn't imagine any punishment worse than a prison sentence for Daniel (I've changed his name to protect his anonymity). I was devastated and didn't know how he or I would be able to endure that fate. How could I help Daniel or lift his spirits for the next two years, when I felt so despondent myself?

After Daniel had been in prison for two months, he sent me a letter telling me that I had been approved for visitation; he added that he hoped I would come to see him soon. I was nervous. As Daniel's drinking had escalated, we'd had very little contact over the past few years. Before I went to visit my son I prayed and also asked my home group to pray for my Higher Power to give me wisdom. I also asked God to go in with me to the prison and direct my thoughts and words. I was really scared.

What happened on that first visit cemented my faith in a Higher Power that has stayed with me to this day. I call it a miracle. Daniel told me how, when he was in a holding area, he picked up a Big Book. As he began to read the chapter "The Doctor's Opinion," he saw himself described on the pages. When he got to the prison where he was to serve his sentence, he found that his counselor was a man who had more than 20 years in AA recovery. Furthermore, he was the only counselor there who was in recovery. This counselor took Daniel though the first six Steps and encouraged him to attend the AA meetings offered in the prison. I immediately sent Daniel a Big Book, the "Twelve and Twelve," and almost all of the AA-approved books, plus some CDs of AA speakers. I also got him a subscription to Grapevine, which I learned means so much to the prisoners here. They look forward to it each month and devour it immediately. Their only complaint is that it isn't longer.

I go to visit Daniel every two or three weeks and look forward to the time we spend together talking about the rewards of a sober life. Daniel admitted to me once, "Strange as it may sound, this is probably the best thing that could've happened to me." He has also said that he looks forward to getting released from jail, finding a sponsor, working the rest of the Steps and attending AA meetings on the outside.

Daniel has three months of his sentence left to serve. Well-intentioned people often ask me, "What's Daniel going to do when he gets out? With his prison record, will he be able to find work? Do you think he'll stay sober?" My answer is, "I don't know." But what I do know is that God is still in charge and has provided what we needed all along. My trust in a Higher Power has grown, and the Promises

are coming true for my son and me. I've no doubt that God will continue to watch over us. All I can do is pray for his will to be done in Daniel's life, and then let go and let God.
