Single and happy

She turned 40 and her date stood her up. That's just fine with her.

I had a date scheduled for this past Friday night. It was a first date; we had met through an internet dating website. When I say we "met," I mean that we had exchanged a few emails, talked on the phone a couple of times and agreed to meet face-to-face to see if there was a connection. Turns out he canceled at the last minute via text message, saying he wasn't feeling well. Whether or not that's true, or another version of the story I made up in my head is the case, I'm OK. And I'm really excited about being OK today.

This week I will have 12 years and nine months without a drink. I love how I count months—as if I were a kid who wants so much to be a grownup. Actually, I just turned 40. I have had my share of experiences with dating in sobriety—some would say more than my share if they knew the details. The fact that I'm OK with a canceled date tells me I'm healing, I'm growing, and I'm learning to love myself for who I am today. And that, my friends, is a gift of sobriety.

In my active alcoholism I was promiscuous, and most of my interactions with men had been all about getting attention and feeling good. By the grace of my Higher Power, I somehow managed to avoid getting a disease, pregnant or physically hurt. At the same time I also avoided any long-term relationships, except for one that ended because he didn't drink enough.

When I got to AA I was full of self-loathing for who I had become. I was angry that I ended up in the rooms, and dating was not even on the radar for me. In meetings I heard the suggestion of "no relationships for a year," and that was a relief since I really didn't want to have anything to do with men at that time.

Don't get me wrong. I discovered men in AA who were kind, happy, and practiced integrity and honesty—quite different from anything I had experienced in the recent past.

My admiration of these qualities has fed a long series of crushes. To this day there may be occasional flirting, maybe even a cup of coffee to explore if a date should follow, but AA has remained a safe place for me. I have learned how to have boundaries with people in general.

But around two years sober I started participating in online dating, since my secret wish of a boyfriend at 366 days did not come true. I had good intentions for a while, but at some point my motives changed and it evolved into another addiction. I liked the attention and the excitement, and I found a way to feel good. I told myself and concerned friends that it was OK since I wasn't drinking, and these men were not in AA.

Eventually my self-loathing returned with a vengeance, and I was making dates a higher priority than going to meetings. I can tell you now that having a service position at my home group saved my life and gave me a reason to keep showing up. I was on my way out; I reached a bottom in sobriety that led me to my knees. I got rigorously honest with my sponsor and myself. Coincidentally, a slew of sponsees showed up in my life to keep me out of my head and out of trouble.

The promise that, "No matter how far down the scale we have gone, we will see how our experience can benefit others" has come true, and I have been able to share my experience when it's been called for.

A few years ago I thought I had fallen in love. He was not a member of AA, but on paper we looked good together. I was convinced he was "the one" and was determined to marry him; but it turns out that my will was not aligned with God's at all. I'm so grateful that God did for me what I couldn't do for myself, and I didn't get married. Nevertheless, I was hurt in a way that removed my ability to trust for a while.

I knew that this too would pass, as everything does, and after some forgiveness and time, I was back online looking for the love of my life. Today I'm clearer than ever about who I am and what I want in a partner. I have developed nurturing friendships with men who respect me (yet another gift of sobriety). A few years ago I had the privilege of being the maid of honor for a friend I got sober with, and she has since started a family. I've watched many friends in AA find and lose love.

Meanwhile, I've come to the conclusion that I'd rather be single and happy than with someone who's not right for me. Today I understand that if someone doesn't want to date me it's not because I'm not good enough; it's because we don't fit.

Once in a while that line in the "Twelve and Twelve" that talks about alcoholics and "our total inability to form a true partnership with another human being" still stings a little. But the truth is, being single has allowed me to have countless fun adventures and provided opportunities to be of service to AA that I would have missed if things were different. I'm not anywhere close to being done growing and learning, and I have hope that someday my Higher Power will think I'm ready to form a partnership. On my way there, I intend to continue trudging the road of happy destiny and insisting on enjoying life.

Central Office Manager's Report July 19, 2019

June activity at the office was on par for this time of year. We received 478 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 133 calls were for meeting info and 137 were office visitors. Our website stayed busy too. It had 57,710 visits in the last 30 days. And Google reports 9,802 views on our profile, 261 visited our website, 45 gave us a call and 35 asked for directions. Taxes have been filed. We reported \$122,808 in total receipts for 2018. Our next door accountant has taken a position with another firm and has sold his business to an accounting firm in Scottsdale.

Our liability insurance policy has been issued. We are now with Philadelphia Indemnity Insurance Co. Our agent has sent the new certificates of liability to the leaseholders of the additionally insured location on the Intergroup policy. If your group participates in the Intergroup policy and your landlord has not received their copy please contact me with a mailing address where our agent should send them and it will be mailed to them. Many of the Groups in the East Valley participate in this coverage and we greatly appreciate those who contribute to help offset this annual expense.

Answer the A.A. hotline, go on an old fashioned 12 step call, take a meeting to a home bound member, share information about A.A. with the public and professional community, help put on an event, print and fold directories and newsletters or take a shift at the office. What's an AA Group?

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The group conscience of AA in the U.S. and Canada seems to have agreed upon six points that define an AA group:

- 1) All members of a group are alcoholics, and all alcoholics are eligible for membership.
- 2) As a group, they are fully self-supporting.
- 3) A group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps.
- 4) As a group, they have no outside affiliation.
- 5) As a group, they have no opinion on outside issues.
- 6) As a group, their public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion, and they maintain personal anonymity at the

Growing Pains

Are we ready for this new surge of acceptance?

From the August 1972 magazine.

THE FELLOWSHIP of Alcoholics Anonymous is now undergoing one of the greatest growing-pains tests in its history. We are experiencing problems with our friends, both professional and nonprofessional, in the field of alcoholism. "Cooperation without affiliation" has not proved to be a simple task to perform.

It may be well to reflect on our program since its birth in 1935, and the evolution that has taken place. In reality, we are a very young movement. The years that have gone by since the beginning do not mean full maturity. For example, the Twelve Concepts were not accepted until 1962.

In years past, problems were numerous with outside agencies and professionals. Hospitals, jails, courts, institutions, doctors, etc. were not too receptive to the program of AA. Frustrating and futile attempts were made to have our program included in the therapy for the suffering alcoholic. Many old-timers will remember the discouragement associated with the attempts to convince these people of our value and our willingness to help our fellow alcoholics. The breakthrough was a painfully slow process, but we did not give up.

Now we are experiencing an overwhelming surge of acceptance from all those who once turned deaf ears when we approached. This trend can only grow even faster, with our newfound friends as our allies in combating alcoholism.

Unfortunately, we hear among our own members a new voice that says to these friends, "Don't use our program. The program is ours. We are the only ones who can carry the message."

It seems ironic. First, we labor to convince all the world that we have a way out, and we recommend the therapy for the alcoholic patient. Then, after we have succeeded, and it is generally recognized that our Twelve Steps are effective, the voice says to the AA working in the field, "No! You are *using*AA."

I hope we can make up our minds what we really want. Our Eighth Tradition tells us that we should not professionalize AA--but I don't believe that a person telling someone about the Twelve Steps of AA, and not his or her own story, is "using" AA. There is a difference.

Most professional programs talk about and recommend the program of Alcoholics Anonymous as a sustaining force for contented sobriety. Usually, new patients are in the therapist's care for approximately two to four weeks, which is only a start. Where do they go after that? As far as I can determine, eventually many of them enter our Fellowship as members.

Let's ask ourselves: "Are we following up as sponsors? Are we fulfilling our responsibility? Is the hand of AA there when anyone, anywhere, reaches out for help?"

Let's take our own inventory, and let's not hide our light under a bushel.
