Sober Cyber Sisters

From the April 1994 Grapevine

In 1994 my son died as a result of severe disabilities and chronic lung disease. He was the absolute joy of my life, and when he died, my life turned into a black tunnel of despair. During the months that followed his death, my drinking escalated rapidly until I was drinking just about every night, having blackouts, and starting to drink on the morning after, just to stop trembling from the hangovers.

After a particularly disastrous blackout where I cracked my jaw open, bit a hole in my tongue, and cut my hands and feet on broken glass, a close friend suggested that maybe I didn't realize how much I was drinking. I was pretty indignant about her statement, but it did get me thinking about the possibility that I had a drinking problem.

One night in April 1996, I was doing my typical drinking ritual: pumping down tequila while logging on to the Internet--i.e., "surfing the Net." The memory of that night is hazy, but I do remember doing a search on alcoholism, taking a self-test of some kind, and being very surprised at the high score I got. Then I found myself involved in some kind of online sobriety group, and I couldn't find a way to get rid of the screen without typing my e-mail address in a little box. Then everything went kind of fuzzy, and I either passed out or blacked out.

The next morning I woke up with a bad hangover, and started looking for the rest of the tequila to take the edge off. Much to my disappointment I found only an empty bottle, so I turned on the computer and checked my e-mail, expecting the usual three or four messages from the few family members and friends with whom I corresponded. What I found was over forty messages, all from women who belonged to some group called Sisters in Sobriety. Evidently I had accidentally joined an online AA group.

My first impulse was to find out how I could get out of this thing that I'd joined while in a drunken stupor, but as I read the messages, I was riveted to the screen. Women from all over the world were telling my story as they related their experience, strength, and hope to me. With tears streaming down my face, I read phrases like "You never have to be alone again," and "We will love you until you can love yourself." I didn't fully grasp

what was happening, but I did know I needed help, and I was deeply touched by the loving messages filtering through cyberspace and into my living room. I'd tried to stop drinking, tried to cut back and drink less, and even tried just drinking beer, but none of it had worked. Each time I drank, things only got worse.

I can't say that when I joined the group I had an honest desire to completely stop drinking. What I was really looking for was a way to drink without hurting myself, getting myself into trouble, or getting sick. But as I listened and learned from these recovering women, the desire to quit grew stronger. I began to understand the disease of alcoholism a little better. For the first time in a long, long time, there was a glimmer of hope in my life.

A month went by, and I was still sober. I also attended "live" AA meetings and

found a sponsor, one of the women in Sisters in Sobriety who happened to live in the same town I lived in. During the worst of my withdrawal from alcohol, she called me, talking me through the fear, anxiety, and sleeplessness. Meanwhile, the e-mail poured in steadily, giving me the support and comfort that I so desperately needed. When I went to California for Christmas, one of my sober cyber sisters met me at the airport and we had coffee together during a flight layover.

I've been sober now for almost eighteen months. I have an online sponsor, one of my fellow Sisters in the e-mail group. When I celebrated my one-year sobriety anniversary, she flew from her home in Dallas to spend the weekend with me and give me my medallion at a meeting. What a blessing it was to be able to give her a real, live hug! I felt as though I'd known her forever, and while she was here, I did my Fifth Step with her. The bond of love that I feel for these special women is impossible to put into words, but it is every bit as real as any other relationship.

Online AA continues to be part of my foundation in sobriety. Even when there's no "live" meeting to go to, I can go online and find another alcoholic to talk to. It's also a great way to reach out to other newcomers who are struggling with sobriety. To me, it is simply proof that God will extend his grace to us wherever we are, even if it is in cyber-space. I'm so grateful for my new, sober life and for my many recovering sisters and brothers all over the world. We are brought closer together by this amazing means of technology, as we share our joy, our pain, our struggles, and our experiences

Thoroughness Ought to be the Watchword The Willingness to Move Forward

When I attended my first AA meeting, I had no idea what the 12 steps entailed but at that meeting I heard the things that were read, and I heard people sharing about steps and, looking back on it now, I realized that I came away from that meeting a changed man. My life took a 180% turn at that point and I have never been the same since. For the first time in my life I saw a refreshing new approach to living an all I had done, up to that point, was to show up and listen. From that day on, I've had a huge change of perception and I've learned to recognize faulty thinking and to

find the answers to life issues as they were articulated by the collective sharing in that meeting. While attending a step study meeting recently, we were on Step 4 and as each person shared their experience with what we had read, it occurred to me that the same thing was happening there, that happened at my first meeting decades before. It seemed that many of the people were assimilating, into their thinking, the things we had read and talked about, and that it had influenced them in ways that they probably didn't even realize at the time. I've heard people in the program, when attending structured step study meetings, say that there may be as many as 50 people at the meeting when they started on Step 1, but by the time they got to Step 4 they might be down to 12 people left in the room. There seems to be something in Step 4 that their ego would not let them address, at the time. It appears they had reached a fork in the road. When this happens, I believe they may not be ready for Step 4 yet, and if they are hurried into it, they may start to search for an easier softer way. If they stay on the softer path for long, they may end up developing a half measures approach and they may waste many precious years, or worse, they may relapse and do irreparable damage that can't be undone.

When I hear of a person who has a relapse after long term sobriety I often wonder if it was due to skimping on Step 4 and 5, which may lead to a superficial approach to the remaining steps. "Thoroughness ought to be the watchword when taking inventory. "(12X12 pg.54) I use the 4th step to illustrate what I mean when describing the way reading and hearing the things described in Step 4, are the things that we live with every day of our lives, and each time we cycle through them again, we realize that we have addressed some of these issues without being aware of it.

I've heard people who have not taken Step 4 yet using such terms as "Restraint of pen and tongue" or "Remove the word blame from my speech" and, without realizing it, they are reducing their problems as the result of this different mindset.

As long as they are honest, about, not being ready to take Step 4, it leaves the door open for the time when they are more confident, and they will be able to revisit this step and make a clean slate of it without feeling guilty about it. I believe that the main reason why they wrote and published the 12 X 12 was because they did not want to establish a precedent of editing the big book, and they wanted to give amplifying information and examples of how to navigate the 12 steps.

We can tell stories and drunkalogues of our drinking days and that's fine, but if we don't go through a meaningful process of addressing the causes and solutions to our problems and "The willingness to move forward " (12X12 pg.54) We will be selling ourselves short, and life is much too precious to waste.

Words From the Big Book

This is perhaps difficult—especially discussing our defects with another person. We think we have done well enough in admitting these things to ourselves. There is doubt about that. In actual practice, we usually find a solitary self-appraisal insufficient. Many of us thought it necessary to go much further. We will be more reconciled to discussing ourselves with another person when we see good reasons why we should do so. The best reason first: If we skip this vital step, we may not overcome drinking. Time after time newcomers have tried to keep to themselves certain facts about their lives. Trying to avoid this humbling experience, they have turned to easier methods. Almost invariably they got drunk. Having persevered with the rest of the program, they wondered why they fell. We think the reason is that they never completed their housecleaning. They took inventory all right, but hung on to some of the worst items in stock. They only thought they had lost their egoism and fear; they only thought they had humbled themselves. But they had not learned enough of humility, fearlessness and honesty, in the sense we find it necessary, until they told someone else all their life story.



Practicing These Principles

From the April 1964 CONFERENCE

IF there are any key words in the fellowship of AA, I believe that they are the words "love and service." To me, service is putting love into action. Initially, this takes the form of "sharing our experience, strength and hope" with other alcoholics that they may have the opportunity to recover in this blessed fellowship, even as you and I have.

The first "sharing" of recovery is usually at regular group meetings. Then groups share with other groups and more new people have an opportunity to participate. This "sharing" is unity, based on the guides of the Twelve Traditions. We learn that, "For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority. . . . a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. . . . "

On April 21, 1964, Delegates (about 85 in all, from the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico) will join together with the Trustees, AA World Service and Grapevine Directors and the Staff members, in the Fourteenth Annual Meeting of the General Service Conference.

In "sharing our experience, strength and hope," each Delegate brings to the Conference the shared experience of his own area, thereby providing for a further continuity of service.

The AA group's purpose is to maintain a meeting place with the door opened wide for the new alcoholic attracted to our fellow-ship. The purpose of the Conference could be said to guarantee that that door and the thousands of other doors all over the world will be kept open as long as AA is needed.

To quote from Concept Nine of the *Twelve Concepts for World Service*: "Let's remember that the base for our service structure rests on the dedication and ability of several thousand General Service Representatives (G.S.R.'s), several hundred Area Committee Members, and nearly a hundred Delegates. These are the direct agents for the AA groups; these are the indispensable links between our fellowship and its world service; these are the primary representatives of AA's group conscience."





Central Office Manager's Report April 17, 2020

In March we received 642 requests for information and assistance. Of those 203 calls were for meeting info, 121 were office visitors and 9 resulted in a good old fashioned 12 step call. Our Google listing also receives steady traffic. Our Google totals for March are not available at the time of this printing. Our website stays busy too. It had 35,928 visits in the last 30 days.

We are all moved into our new location and open for business. Sending a big "Thank You" to all who showed up on moving day and did the heavy lifting. We did have some difficulty with Century Link getting the phones transferred so we are now Cox Communication customers. We now have PayPal available on our website for group and individual contributions. Thanks to everyone who has taken advantage of this and made a contribution.

The biggest challenge we have had recently is in providing an accurate meeting directory. Things have changed fast and sometimes people forget to inform us of these changes. We have added a list of online meetings to the website as well as other helpful information on setting up electronic meetings. We have also tagged meetings that we believe to be temporarily suspended, this will also update the Meeting Finder app. Please check your meetings listing and if it is not correct let me know.

Good connections of the month: There were many and they are still going on. Sales, office visits and calls have slowed but the calls we are getting seem to have a little more urgency to them. People are needing to connect, and we are setting up more 12 (phone) calls.

AAWS has new pricing on many items effective April 15. This is not an increase or decrease but rather an averaging adjustment or normalized pricing. We haven't had to order literature in the last month as our sales are all but nonexistent. We will update our pricing when we place our next order.

If you are signed up for 12 step service, please try to be available if called. We have received several calls from those who are afraid for their sobriety and the availability of fellowship support. A simple phone call to remind someone they are not alone could make all the difference.

Thanks to everyone for rising to the occasion and keeping our spirit of service alive in these trying times. I am both amazed and humbled by the outpouring of support we have received in the last month. The way we meet and serve may be changing but the hand of A.A. is alive and well.

Doing Time

From the APRIL 1998 Grapevine

Two years into sobriety I was taking a friend to an AA meeting when he said I should get involved in service work. He'd been sober four months, for the third time, and my thought was "Who is he to tell me what to do?" But having learned to listen to all, including newcomers, I said, "I'll give it some thought." During the next week I attended many meetings and heard something about service work at each one. I began to grow restless and feel uneasy. At the end of the week I took the same friend to another meeting, and the speaker said she was going to celebrate her tenth AA birthday the following week. She also said she had found AA while in jail.

So I decided to attend a monthly Hospitals and Institutions Committee meeting and there said I wanted to start an AA meeting in a facility known as the Jail Annex. I was told I'd be wasting my time if I tried; there had been several unsuccessful attempts over the previous three years. One old-timer, God bless him, said, "Let him try, it can't hurt anything." Ten days later I conducted my first meeting at the Jail Annex.

My only fear about this meeting was that someone was going to ask, "Did you ever do any time?" It was a very real fear and it was constantly on my mind. You see, I'd never been "in jail" except to take a test to see if I was drunk and wait for a friend to come and drive me home. I was afraid to ask someone on the Hospitals and Institutions Committee how to answer for fear they wouldn't let me do the meeting. I was at a loss as to how to answer the question if it arose. I imagined that the inmates would reject and make fun of me. I'd lose any credibility or respect they might have had for me. What should I do?

At meetings, during the silence before the Serenity Prayer, I'd always pray, "God, let me hear what I need to hear, say what I need to say, and be of help to newcomers if it be thy will." So I decided to turn it over to my Higher Power--he would direct me in how to answer.

Sure enough, at the third meeting, an inmate asked in a challenging voice, "You ever do any time?" I immediately blurted out loudly, "Twenty-eight years!" Needless to say there was total silence--I had their undivided attention. None of them had done that much time. When I realized what I'd said, I thanked God for putting those words in my mouth, and I went on to describe what it was like to be imprisoned *in* bars, not behind them. I told how alcohol had controlled my life and was my jailer, and how Alcoholics Anonymous had set me free. I said that alcohol no longer controlled my thoughts and actions, as the penal system controlled theirs. I saw that they were identifying with me, and I felt immense gratitude.

Now, more than eight years later, I'm still filled with gratitude, and I speak--(without fear)--at Hospitals and Institutions meetings. I'm also grateful I had that fear in the beginning, for out of it came a stronger belief and faith that my Higher Power would not give me more than I could handle.

"There, but for the Grace of God, go I" is the thought I carry away from each meeting I attend in an in-

stitution, treatment center, or any other place where there are confined alcoholics. Sharing with the confined alcoholic is a great way to "do time" and stay sober.
