My First Miracle

At thirty years old, I have just realized that I've never had faith. It certainly explains my feeling of never quite belonging, never connecting, not feeling like "one of the gang" for many years. It wasn't until recently, through my recovery and involvement with AA, that I started discovering faith and seeing what I've been missing all my life.

I will celebrate ninety days of sobriety this week, and I can't believe how much my life has changed in three short months. I've never been able to commit to anything for very long, except for drinking. I tried rollerblading, aerobics, swimming, and karate to make me feel healthy, but I always ended up with a glass of wine at the end of the day. I read self-help books and went to therapy, but still found myself resorting to alcohol. I used alcohol to take the edge off everything. It felt good at the time, but prevented me from actually having to deal with anything difficult.

My life had become one smoothed-over mess. I was divorced, depressed, and exhausted from running from reality for so long.

It could have been the toxic relationship I found myself in or the feeling of being so out of control that got me sober. Or maybe it was the sensation of constantly looking over my shoulder, waiting for someone to tell me that they had figured me out: they knew my secret; they knew I was a phony and a bad person. I wanted so much to settle down, get married, and have a family, but each drink brought me further and further away from that dream. And I couldn't understand why.

After all my attempts to quit didn't work, when antidepressants didn't work,

when I began to have more weekends lost to blackouts than I could rationalize, I walked into the arms of AA. I completed an intensive outpatient program and attended AA meetings, slowly at first.

My faith developed gradually. One day I realized my faith was a powerful one. It wasn't an epiphany, but a series of subtle clues that led me to freedom. It began with the discovery that there was an AA meeting across the street from my office, which met three times a week. Then a friend referred me to a friend of hers in the

Fellowship, and we hit it off immediately. She became my sponsor.

The last and most powerful sign that I was opening up my heart and allowing something in to help me came only recently. I had just canceled my group therapy appointment to attend an AA meeting where my sponsor was to speak. But on my way there I started feeling like a kid who was cutting class and began thinking old, sneaky thoughts: "Maybe I can skip the meeting and go shopping. But what will I tell my sponsor? Lie? No, I can't. I'll get on the freeway and let the traffic decide. If it's not too bad, I'll keep heading to the mall. If it's crowded, I'll exit toward the meeting." Well, not three minutes into my freeway ride, I was slowed down by traffic and noticed the license-plate holder on the car in front of me. It said, "Alcoholics do it in groups." Decision made, I took the first exit toward the meeting without a second thought.

I listened to my sponsor speak and knew I was in the right place. I didn't know anyone except her, but I felt I was surrounded by friends. I was bursting with emotion and with a comfort and serenity I had never known. The principles, the Promises, the stories being told, the feelings being shared, meant something to me. For the first time in my life, I connected, I related, I belonged.

As I drove home after the meeting, I felt entranced. I was experiencing something I had only heard people talking about. I felt full, complete, safe, and secure. I felt this way from within, unlike the times when I seemed to get all my feelings from external sources. It was amazing. And I knew I was going to keep coming back for more.



Central Office Manager's Report May 15, 2020

In April we received 436 requests for information and assistance. Of those 143 calls were for meeting info, only 52 were office visitors and 15 resulted in a good old fashioned 12 step call. Our Google listing also receives steady traffic. Our Google totals for April are 4,432 searches resulting in 474 visits to our website and 50 calls. Our website stays busy too. It had 28,371 visits in the last 30 days.

Our biggest challenge is still to provide an accurate meeting directory. Our website directory is updated daily as new information is provided. This updates the Meeting Guide app also keeping it up to date. Things are still changing on a daily basis and groups need to remember to inform us of these changes. We have added a list of online meetings to the website as well as other helpful information on set up and security for electronic meetings. We have also tagged meetings that we believe to be temporarily suspended, this will also update the Meeting Finder app. Please check your meetings listing and if it is not correct let me know.

We now have PayPal available on our website for contributions. If you use PayPal for a Group Contribution please state that in the notes section so we can record it correctly. Many thanks to those who have been sending Individual and Group contributions recently, it is much appreciated.

Good connections of the month: There were many and they are still going on. Sales, office visits and calls have started to pick back up a bit. People are needing to connect by whatever means they are comfortable with, and we are here to help them do that.

AAWS has new pricing on many items effective April 15. This is not an increase or decrease but rather an averaging adjustment or normalized pricing. We haven't had to order literature in the last month as our sales are all but nonexistent. We will update our pricing when we place our next order.

If you are signed up for 12 step service, please try to be available if called. We have received several calls from those who are afraid for their sobriety and the availability of fellowship support. A simple phone call to remind someone they are not alone could make all the difference.

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A Newcomer to the Rescue

From the JANUARY 2001 Grapevine

Shortly after I celebrated my first year of sobriety, you might say that my prayers were answered when my husband decided to join the program. He came to me drunk late one night and asked for help. I was speechless, but quickly jumped up and made a pot of coffee. We talked for a couple of hours, crying together. Then he fell asleep on my shoulder. My mind was racing: "Would he remember our conversation in the morning? Would he still want to go to a meeting?" I was excited at the thought of both of us being in recovery together and scared to death that my expectations would get the best of me.

The next day he did remember. It was the Fourth of July weekend, and my home group, Easy Does It, was having an Alcathon with a meeting every two hours for the entire weekend. We headed to a noon meeting and met up with some old-timers and friends in the program who had met my husband and knew he was struggling. Their eyes just lit up when he announced himself as a newcomer not even twenty-four hours sober, and after the meeting, they embraced him with that special love I've witnessed only in AA. That night, we went back to a midnight candlelight meeting and my husband stood up and got his twenty-four-hour chip. I cried thankful tears and was filled once again with hope.

But that's not the real point of this story. The real point concerns something that happened about forty days later.

It was an evening when this baffling disease was overwhelming me, an evening when the words of a newcomer would make all the difference. We had gone down to Tucson to visit our family, and I found myself struggling with crazy thoughts like, "Why me? Why do I have to be an alcoholic?" Blah, blah, blah, on my head went with the self-pity that gets me at the most unexpected times. I headed outside to walk our dog and to get some fresh air, when my husband came looking for me. He knew I was having a bad day. It was pretty obvious, since I was being quiet and irritable. He found me in the small courtyard in front of my dad's condo, sitting on the little brick wall under the olive tree. I must have looked sad, but he sat with me and listened as I cried, "Why did I have to be in this silly program anyway?" and on I went complaining.

Then my husband did something incredible. He took my hands in his and said, "Come on, let's have a little meeting." I looked up at him, completely puzzled, and replied, "What?"

He said, "Come on, let's have a moment of silence followed by the Serenity Prayer."

I hung my head and started sobbing. He was quiet for a minute and then started the amazing little prayer: "God grant me the serenity. . ."

I found myself reciting it with him. Then he began to recite the AA Preamble.

"Alcoholics Anonymous is a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other. . ." He didn't know all the words, but I quickly joined in and we tried to remember them together. Before I knew it, I was laughing and shaking my head in amazement. We talked for about half an hour, and he shared how grateful he was for his sobriety and how lucky we were to have found the program. The confusing thoughts that had haunted me just minutes before began to melt away. My attitude was completely turned around, and for the first time I saw my husband for the fragile, yet incredible, newcomer that he was. Then after sharing and talking, he surprised me again and said, "Okay, let's close with the Lord's Prayer." We held hands and said the prayer together, closing the smallest, most powerful AA meeting I've ever attended.
