NO BOOZE NEWS

A Submission from a friend in Florence State Prison

"There exists among us a fellowship". How true these words are for me today. Looking back I am not confident that I ever truly understood what that term meant, fellowship, but today it is one of the most powerful assets I have available to me.

Residing in a small town in Arizona exists a group known as The Freedom Fighters Group of Alcoholics Anonymous and this is my home group. In fact, it is one of my only groups because I am incarcerated in prison for driving under the influence. I love our group not just because it is one of the few available to me but because of the strength within our fellowship and the amazing recovery we have at our meetings.

And one more thing; none of us would be here today if somebody hadn't taken time to explain things to us, to give us a little pat on the back, to take us to a meeting or two, to have done numerous little kind and thoughtful acts in our behalf.

So let us never get the degree of smug complacency so that we're not willing to extend or attempt to, that help which has been so beneficial to us, to our less fortunate brothers.

Prison is a place of extremes. Its where the world throws the dregs of society "to be taught a lesson" and to " do time for our crimes". Prison is extremely lonely and emotional, here there are extreme personalities, extreme anger, fear and of course extreme using. A man feels lost and unsure of himself when first cast out onto a yard. He may look anywhere to feel a part of, or to fit in. Unfortunately there are many roads that can be taken in the wrong direction if one is not careful. This is where the Freedom Fighters step in. Why? Because this is the action asked of us in the fellowship. It is not only a tradition but rather our duty to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers.

Someone years ago approached me and for that I am forever indebted, so I must pay it back by carrying the message to others. Our group may not be all that unique. We follow the twelve traditions to the best of our ability, and our meeting styles are common formats. However, there is something particularly moving to have a fellowship in a location where there is not much hope among the men around you. The men here are searching for something upon arrival, a friend, a chance, a glimmer of hope, anything. In the Twelve and Twelve it reads " When these 'last-gaspers' laid hold of these principles with all the fervor with which the drowning seize life preservers they invariably got well". That is what I see around me, men drowning in the turbulent sea of prison. So our fellowship casts out life

preservers over and over reeling men in.

Its amazing how open and willing someone is when they have lost all that is dear to them and is locked up in prison. We welcome these men, we

remember their names, offer them literature and tell them to keep coming back. Our meetings and fellowship are often the relief they are looking for, and the connection they have been longing for. Because for just one hour a day in our room we are no longer in prison and can truly be ourselves and help one another. We still of course have extremes in our meetings like personalities, but mostly extreme love for each other, and recovery. During my four years attending this meeting I have experienced so much. I went through the steps, I have been blessed to have sponsees and even grand sponsees. At the end of the meeting when asked who's willing to sponsor nearly every hand goes up.

We have seen many success stories, and of course experienced some tough losses. No matter what is faced we have the strength because we are now bound with new and wonderful ties. Today we are more than The Freedom Fighters group of Alcoholics Anonymous. We are brothers.

I encouraged our AA group to open up earlier for fellowship and snacks. Everyone thought it was a good idea, however no one wanted to open that early, so I did it! I made coffee and brought some snacks in. I also started paying attention to what my fellows shared at our meetings. I would try to catch many of them afterward and give them a hug or a friendly smile. If they seemed to be struggling, I'd ask if they would like to go somewhere to have coffee and talk. If not—and usually it was not—at least I had asked. Before long I was not noticing "my" holidays and "my" problems.

I made a lot of meetings looking for someone to cheer up. I don't know how much it helped those I encountered, but it sure kept me content and sober through the holidays. Before I knew it, it was New Year's Eve and time for our annual alkathon!

I used to dread the torture around Thanksgiving and Christmas. Those days never felt like holidays to me. But now I'm grateful I have found the answer. May we all have a sane and sober New Year!





Central Office Manager's Report October 15, 2021

In September we received 556 requests for information and assistance. Of those 123calls were for meeting info, 137 were office visitors and 17 resulted in a 12-step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 24,142 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google listing received 8,899 views in September with 56 giving us a call, 443 visiting our website and 42 requesting directions to the office.

A request for a 12-step call was received from a person in London, England. They have been sponsoring someone in our area over Zoom and wanted to get them connected locally. We provided meeting and contact information and he was going to pass it on to his friend.

We have our new cash register with bar code scanner set up and in use now. A large book order was placed and received at the end of the month to restock after the 2-month literature sale. SRI and Area 03 are now receiving meeting directory updates directly from our website. This gives them the most accurate and up to date meeting information for our area. I am currently updating the website every Wednesday and the printed directory every month. Please drop me an email at the office, info@aamesaaz.org, if you need an update to a meeting in the directory this will also update the Meeting Guide App.

I have been gathering quotes to purchase media air time to run Alcoholics Anonymous public service announcements over the holidays. Local broadcast airtime for a 30 second spot varies in price based on program ratings. For instance, a 30 second spot during the evening news at 10pm is \$550 while overnight programing from midnight to 4am are \$10 each. Upon approval of funds, we will do our best to negotiate a package for price, placement and quantity. Ultimately, we will rely on our Higher Power to have these spots reach the intended audience. These audio and video PSA's can be viewed on GSO's website at aa.org.

Service opportunities are always available on all EVI committees and the 12th step list. Gratitude with Service forms are now available on our website. Please encourage your Group members to volunteer for a service position. The life they save may be their own.

How a newcomer gets through his first stressful sober Thanksgiving

Holidays, for me, were always fueled by alcohol. I used to like to say that if you shook my family tree, bottles would fall everywhere. However, it turns out that I was the alcoholic.

I started drinking when I was 15 and quickly fell into the abyss of alcoholism. When I was 18, I came up with three "rules" so I wouldn't be labeled as someone with a drinking problem: 1) never drink alone; 2) never drive drunk; and 3) never go to a bar by myself. Looking back, it seems strange that an 18-year-old would have created "rules" to drink by, especially since that someone (me) had no other life plans.

Holidays were joyous occasions in my family, and relatives would come over to my parents' house. As I began to drink more, I became what I now call an "eve drinker." On the eve of every holiday—Christmas, Thanksgiving, you name it—I would always be in a bar or drinking with my family or with friends at home. It didn't matter where I was, as long as there was alcohol. On Christmas Eve my family always went to a friend's house for libations and food. I'd hang out in the kitchen all night with the caterers and drink vast quantities of beer, telling them what a fine job they were doing. Then I'd go home and pass out. Christmas was especially great because I would usually get a case or two of beer as a gift. My family and friends knew what I appreciated. In retrospect, I used alcohol as a way to numb myself through the holidays.

By the time I was in my early 20s, I'd already been fired from two good jobs, and both times alcohol was involved. I wouldn't actually show up on the job drunk, but I had the "ism" of not feeling appreciated, and I would talk badly about other people. I was always thinking that I "deserved better than this." I never did anything to earn praise or promotions. So when I went to my parents' house for the holidays I would be filled with shame and guilt about how my life was turning out. Of course, my response was to turn to alcohol. I always ramped up my drinking during the holidays.

Then one day, after the July 4th holidays of 1993 were over, I finally decided I had had enough. On July 13, I put down the booze and walked into the Green House Group of AA in Winter Park, Fla. After about three months, I finally got a home group and a sponsor. But I still didn't know what to do with myself. Getting sober was tough enough, what with the withdrawals, the mood swings and the night terrors and all, but now I was about to face the horror of sober holidays. I had no concept of "one day at a time" yet. Imagine, I thought to myself, going through Thanksgiving and Christmas—much less New Year's Eve—without alcohol!

I wasn't calling my sponsor much because my phone (which I so freely used drunk) felt like it weighed 500 pounds when I would go to check in. But I made sure to go to a meeting on Thanksgiving eve, figuring that since this was a huge drinking night for me, I should be with fellow alcoholics. So far, so good. I was really nervous, but I never told anyone about my fear of the holidays.

The next day, Thanksgiving morning, I went to take a shower. My partner and I were getting ready to go over to relatives for the big meal. Suddenly I was overwhelmed with the urge to drink. I decided I would indeed drink. I was strangely calm about my decision and was grateful that I would finally put this monster to rest. But as I stepped out of the shower, it suddenly hit me that I should call my sponsor and tell him about my great idea. To this day I have no idea why I had that thought. Was it divine intervention? I still do not know.

So with a towel wrapped around my waist and dripping water everywhere, I finally picked up that 500-pound phone and dialed my sponsor's number. I told him I was going to drink. He said that he could not stop me from drinking, but before I did why didn't my partner and I come to his house and have some Thanksgiving dinner? I agreed, thinking I would go, stay a little while, and then go get drunk. So I called my family, canceled my participation in their meal, and trundled off to my sponsor's home. I wish I could say I was happy, but I was not. The urge to drink was very strong, and to admit defeat was not in my language that day. But I kept driving until I got to his house.

When we walked in, there stood several members of my home group, with my sponsor and his wife, who is also in the program. We all looked at each other and smiled. They greeted me with genuine hospitality and warmth. Everyone in that house was sober. And I was sober. It turned out to be a really special day.

What I learned that day is that in order to stay sober I have to take action. Driving, phone calls, whatever it takes to not take a drink. I also learned that I have to continue to ask for help; it's not a one-time deal. I don't necessary know how to run my life, and I need to keep asking for help.

On that Thanksgiving Day in 1993 I saw that together with other members of Alcoholics Anonymous, we can stay sober rather than fight a losing battle by ourselves. That has been the greatest gift I've received in AA, and one that I'm thankful for 365 days a year, not just on Thanksgiving Day.
