Every so often at an Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) meeting I hear a newcomer share that most of his old friends stopped coming around and that he thought that he was losing them. Sometimes this may be distressful and may cause a person to question whether the sacrifice is worth the loss of those old acquaintances.

Sometimes the word friend is misunderstood. We often refer to people we are associated with as friends. Others will say that you can count on one hand the true friends you will have in a lifetime. So where do these associates/acquaintances come in?

I played golf for about 35 years and had many so-called golfer friends but when the round of golf was over, we put our clubs in the car and went our separate

ways. Fishing was the same. When we finished fishing, we put the rods and tackle box in the car and went home.

With these acquaintances, the common denominator was the golf or the fishing. That is what bound us to each other. I quit playing golf about 15 years ago and when the common denominator was gone, I did not continue to go to the golf course to hang out with them. I seldom saw my old golfing friends except in passing where we exchanged pleasantries and again were on our separate ways.

Most of the, so called, friends I had before I got sober had only one thing in common with me and that was the drinking. Unlike the golf and the fishing, we could drink 24 hours a day if we wanted to. We did not need a boat or even a set of clubs to associate with each other. The bottle was all that was necessary and without it we had little in common. When the common denominator was gone, trying to hang out with them became awkward for them and for me. I had to accept that

reality and let them be. If we have anything else in common, we will know it

At once I think of my own doctor, William Duncan Silkworth, and how he ministered to me with the language of the heart during the last shattering years of my alcoholism. Love was his magic, and with it he accomplished this wonder: he conveyed to the foggy mind of the drunk that here was a human being who understood, and who cared without limit.

He was one who would gladly walk the extra mile with us, and if necessary (as it often was) even the last mile of all. At that time he had already tried to help over twenty thousand drunks, and he had failed with nearly all. Only here and there had this dismal experience of futility been brightened by a genuine recovery.

People wondered how he could go on, how he could still believe in the possibility of help for chronic alcoholics. Yet he did believe with a faith that never faltered. He kept saying, "Someday we'll find the answer."

and share that association with each other, but that was seldom the case except for family members or work associates.

We, in A.A. are fortunate indeed for we have a common denominator that has been likened to the survivors on a sinking ship, in a lifeboat, caring for each other. We associate at such a deep and intimate level that we develop true friendships that the average person seldom is exposed to. Understanding this can be a great comfort to those new members who may need to be prepared to move on with their lives.

If that new member is fortunate enough to adopt the A.A. program for the long haul, he may become the true friend that those old acquaintances in the bar room may need should they become a troubled alcoholic seeking help themselves. I cannot tell you how many true friends I have developed in the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, but *I have been grappling them unto my soul* for over 50 years now. Thank you for the advice Mr. Shakespeare.

Step Seven: "We humbly asked Him to remove our Shortcomings."

I'm at a turning point in my Recovery Process. Having worked the first Six Steps, Step Seven is the bridge crossed to working the remaining Five Steps!

I was not able to work on my outer life until tackling my inner issues. Because I work the Program of Alcoholics Anonymous does not change life on life's terms. It allowed my life to become tolerable and acceptable.

I'm aware of choice today and a way out of misery, something I could not fathom while active in drinking. No one could convince me an Alcoholic of hopelessness and helplessness, I could and would be restored a spirit contrite, humbled, and a heart full of repentance. Help began when crossing the threshold of the rooms of Alcoholics Anonymous. Witnessing folks like myself and admission that they to continue to struggle with shortcomings refreshed my soul. I was no longer alone!

I receive the courage needed to continue in my perseverance to stay sober and grow in recovery. Giving up control proved difficult. Any life programmed by self will rarely surrenders without a struggle. The delusion I could retain some shortcomings was relieved with the help of my Higher Power!

This is why Humility is such an important part of this Step! I did what my sponsor told me. Like in the Potter's story had to be crushed into a lump of clay again and started over! Just as the clay was in the hands of the Potter, I was in the palms of Alcoholics Anonymous. I can't ask for help once and be done with it. Intentions proceed actions! Persistence overcomes resistance!

I practice Step Seven this way, I'm assured my Higher Power will respond by giving me what's best and removing my shortcoming. My Higher Power's Mercy outweighs His Wrath! It doesn't matter where we fit in society. It is the Humbled Heart that opens the door to God's forgiveness. Putting forth the effort, I trust God to remove my Shortcomings moment by moment. I allow myself to become Anonymous, just another drunk struggling to stay sober one day at a time!



Central Office Manager's Report June 18, 2021

In May we received 471 requests for information and assistance last month. Of those 131 calls were for meeting info, 121 were office visitors and 15 resulted in a 12-step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 29,593 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google listing also receives steady traffic. Our Google totals for May were 8,630 views. Of those 481 went to our website, 57 requested directions and 65 gave us a call.

Our Corporation Commission filing and annual report has been submitted for 2021. We have also renewed our Fire permit with the City of Mesa and our accountant is working on our 2020 tax filing.

Hard copies of Box 459, the newsletter from GSO, are no longer being mailed to unpaid subscribers. For \$12 we have ordered a bulk subscription of 20 issues quarterly to be available at the office.

Most of the usual summertime events are coming back. Be sure to check the events page on our website for all the AZ A.A. events that we know of. Please let me know of any upcoming events or meeting changes so we can keep our posted information accurate.

If your Group has recently had a rotation of officers, please take a Group Update form to your next Group Conscious meeting. Have the new officers fill it out completely and return it to the office or bring it to next month's meeting. It is our policy to have complete contact information for at least 2 officers of each group listed in our directories. Thanks for your help with this, it is important to keep this information up to date. Service opportunities are always available on all EVI committees and the 12th step list. Traditions Checklist

Tradition Seven: Every AA group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions.

- 1. Honestly now, do I do all I can to help AA (my group, my central office, my GSO) remain self-supporting? Could I put a little more into the basket on behalf of the new guy who can't afford it yet? How generous was I when tanked in a barroom?
- 2. Should the Grapevine sell advertising space to book publishers and drug companies, so it could make a big profit and become a bigger magazine, in full color, at a cheaper price per copy?
- 3. If GSO runs short of funds some year, wouldn't it be okay to let the government subsidize AA groups in hospitals and prisons?
- 4. Is it more important to get a big AA collection from a few people, or a smaller collection in which more members participate?
- 5. Is a group treasurer's report unimportant AA business? How does the treasurer feel about it?

Any comments/questions/suggestions from the floor? Kain H. -(TWO) makes a motion to start selling all literature at cost beginning in August. Seconded by Larry R. - (Basic 2). Question from the floor of at what cap or end time? Motion revised to include only August and September. Treasurer noted that we are looking for a display case to purchase and we don't know the amount of the POS would be. Another question is would a scanning mobile piece be a part of the POS? We currently sell literature at the GSO published cost and we keep the bulk discount that we receive for ordering in bulk.

Motion tabled until July, for groups to have a chance to discuss.

NEW BUSINESS:

We have a seconded motion from the Steering committee regarding the Office Manager annual review. Motion: "Based on the recent annual Office Manager's Evaluation, the EVI Steering Committee

recommends a 4% pay increase for Kim W retroactive to her anniversary date". We recommend a 4% raise, particularly in light of the great job done in the middle of the pandemic, the office move, the change in phone answering system, etc. Last year we gave only a 2% cost of living raise considering the conditions. This will go back to the groups and be voted on next month.

Simple majority vote:

In person - 11 votes for, 0 votes against, 0 abstentions.

Virtual - 11 votes for, 0 votes against, 2 abstentions.

Total - 22 votes for, 0 votes against, 2 abstentions. Motion passes.

Kaine H. makes a motion that there is a 6 month sobriety requirement to join the Unity committee. Larry R. seconds. Discussion: We did not have sobriety requirements for two of our committees. Policy and Procedures currently says they should have 12 months. When manual was updated it was a cut and paste error. It was noted that some members are against a requirement for sobriety, changing it to a suggestion and a willingness to serve. This is to reach a broader amount of members such as including a 3 month sober person who wants to be on the committee. Kaine/Larry changes it to Unity committee members should have a recommended 6 months of sobriety.

How Kind Is It?

Love and tolerance one misstep at a time.

When i was fairly new in the Program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I started to feel pretty sure of myself. I was in for a rude awakening, as so many of us are when we are new. One night, I was talking with a friend after the meeting and she mentioned a mutual friend who was having problems. She informed me that he only went to one meeting a week and she felt that this was the source of the difficulty. Would I be willing to have a quiet chat with him about it? Of course, I would! I made straight for the poor, unsuspecting newcomer and promptly told him what I thought of his attendance schedule. He shocked me when he seemed to be hurt by my intrusion. I felt badly when I never saw him again in a meeting. The problem was that I was trying to compel him to do something, instead of trying to be of service.

Some years later, I was sharing in a meeting when this newcomer kept interrupting. I gently informed him that the protocol of the meeting is that the person recognized by the leader has the floor and all others have to wait to be recognized. Once again, I saw the look of pain on another's face. The First Tradition does state that the "AA member has to conform to the principles of recovery" on page 130 of the "Twelve and Twelve," but just how does the newcomer learn these things? Was it my job to stop the meeting and inform them right then and there? Seems that my ego was getting in the way again. Unfortunately, I haven't seen him since.

I had been turned off when someone else tried to play the part of the big shot in a meeting, but was not so quick to see where I was doing the same thing. The Big Book says on page 89 that "to be helpful is our only aim." It also says in *Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers* on page 270 that the program is "one drunk talking to another, never down to another." I was demonstrating a shortage of tolerance.

I have been in meetings where someone gets out of line and someone else is quick to chime in with how the first person needs to change their behavior to the accepted standard. Sometimes that person gets mad and walks out, never to be seen again. I always felt bad for the person leaving. Wasn't there a better way to handle these situations? I began to feel drawn to those old-timers who had the smarts to wait until after the meeting to take these newcomers aside and explain how things work. I myself was the recipient of some pretty good advice handed out while washing coffee cups. I was glad that I wasn't getting the advice in front of the group. Maybe I should treat others as I enjoyed being treated myself?

I had been forgetting a great line in *Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers* on page 273, which says, "Without some tolerance, we might tend to become a bit smug or superior--which, of course, is not helpful to the person we are trying to help and might be quite painful or obnoxious to others."

My sponsor's advice was to say nothing that is not "true, necessary, and kind." Very similar to the words that Dr. Bob spoke in Cleveland in 1950 at his last talk, as quoted on page 338 of *Dr. Bob and the Good Oldtimers:* "Let us also remember to guard against that erring member the tongue, and if we must use it, let's use it with kindness and consideration and tolerance."

Great advice for someone like me who needs to remember that the program of Alcoholics Anonymous is one of attraction rather than promotion. We all fit in the same box as long as we remember to stay the right size. I once saw a slogan on a clubhouse wall which read, "Nobody act big, nobody act small, everybody act medium."
