## **Gadget Geek**

I admit it: I'm a gadget geek. I love new technology and all the promise it brings. I'm an enthusiast for technology in AA as well, mostly because I've seen it improve my ability to do face-to-face Twelfth Step work and service work. I think AA is better off today than when I got sober because of the things that are now available. I know some people in AA are concerned that using technology could harm the program. They worry about anonymity breaks or about technology replacing the connectedness of being together at a meeting. While these concerns are valid, my own experience over 25 years is that evolving technology has made it easier to stay sober and carry the message. Let me give you a few examples.

#### **Quote of the Month**

The meetings gave me what my sponsor likes to call one of the most important words in the Big Book: A.A. put a "we" in my life. "We admitted we were powerless over alcohol. . . . " I no longer had to be alone. Fellowship and activity kept me coming back long enough to work the Twelve Steps. The more I did, the better I felt. I started hanging out with my sponsor and some active people at the meetings. They showed me how gratitude is something that is demonstrated, not talked about—gratitude is action. Starting out, I just wanted to keep the authorities off my back. I never bargained for this program's changing the course of my life or showing me the way to freedom and happiness."

Today, young people don't know of a time when people didn't have their own personal phone. When I got sober, we didn't have cell phones. To talk to my sponsor on the phone, for example, I'd have to cup a hand over my mouth so my mom wouldn't overhear me as I whispered into the phone attached to the wall in the kitchen. Sharing a phone didn't give you privacy to make and receive AA calls. Even if your family had an answering machine at home, you'd have to listen to each message in order to find out if there was one message for

you. Often messages would get erased on the old-style answering machines; it was horrible. Today, another member can easily leave me a message on my phone, and I get notified who left the message

and when. Also, AA members can text me to let me know where they are going for fellowship after the meeting. These things enhance my ability to get together with other AAs—they don't detract from it.

Twenty-five years ago, it was much harder to find meetings. For one thing, you had to rely on a printed meeting list that didn't get updated very often because it was costly and time-consuming to put it together. There was no way to look up a meeting on the web. You'd have to call a central office and go through a series of questions about when, where, what format, and time, just to find what you were looking for. Once you found a meeting to go to, you'd have to use paper maps to try to navigate to the meeting. Today, finding a meeting is much easier. Even when I'm traveling, I can search for meetings online. I use a variety of filters to find a meeting with the right time and format; then I use the GPS on my phone to navigate perfectly to the meeting—even in an unknown city. I'm sure today I go to more meetings in more places because technology helps me find them.

Today, I have a digital calendar that notifies me of AA events, and I get emails from service committees reminding me of district meetings and area assemblies. Back when I got sober, I tried to write things down on a calendar. However, if I didn't check the calendar, I'd often double-book things or worse, completely forget. Technology also allows me to meet with people who aren't even in my city. On different occasions, I've had the opportunity to be broadcast over a live video feed to a prison hundreds of miles away, I've participated in conference call meetings, and I've done a concept study using a video chat with people from four different states. None of that was possible when I first got sober.

When I first started doing service work it wasn't easy to stay up-to- date with the people doing the same types of work in my area. As area corrections chair, for example, the way I found out what people were doing was by attending committee meetings at our quarterly assemblies. Today, I get emails and even text updates about service happenings in my district, area, and even my region. All these modes of communication allow me much more frequent contact with AA. I'm also connected to people all over the country doing AA technology service by using many online tools. I'm able to quickly ask service questions and get answers. I don't have to reinvent the wheel every time, like I did when I developed the first AA website my area had. Now I can share with others all over the country about best practices and ways to scale and implement AA technology.

Over the years, as technology has improved, I've seen how its adoption throughout AA has made it easier



and better to connect with AA. I get concerned when people bash the use of these tools and suggest that technology will take away or harm our meetings and interactions. My own experience has been that technology doesn't replace eyeball-to-eyeball recovery work, but it makes face-to-face interactions more possible and makes service opportunities more available. I can't wait to see what the next 25



years bring us.



## Central Office Manager's Report February 18, 2021

January set the year off to a good start. We received several calls from people concerned about theirs or a loved one's drinking. Twelve step calls were set up, information on our program and directions to the meetings close to them was provided. We received 492 requests for information and assistance. Of those 126 calls were for meeting info, 113 were office visitors and, 17 resulted in a 12-step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 37,695 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google listing received 4,510 views in January with 36 giving us a call, 375 visiting our website and 57 requesting directions to the office.

The year-end inventory went well thanks to some very helpful volunteers. Our discrepancy was -\$160.87, with a total retail inventory value of \$28,544.10. We received a literature order earlier this month. Hard cover Big Books are still not available but World Services expects them to ship by the end of February. We do have plenty of Big Books in other formats, soft cover, large print etc.

The W-2 has been distributed and W-3 filed with Social Security. The 2 NSF checks and charges from last year have been covered by the submitter. All accounts have been reconciled and are correct to date.

There are copies of the 2019 Year End Activity Report of your Central Office. Please take a few copies back to your group. This report helps to answer that often-asked question "What do you do at the office?"

# Goodbye Perryville: A woman in Arizona expresses gratitude for the time she spent in a nearby prison.

From the December 2014 Grapevine

Friday night I brought my "last" meeting to Perryville, a womens' prison in Goodyear, Arizona. My badge expires this month, and in the spirit of rotation, I've chosen not to renew it after five years of service.

Back in the fall of 2008, my heart was terribly broken, so I jumped at the chance to be of service, desperately needing to get out of myself. This commitment very well may have saved my life and my sobriety at that time. Having never been arrested myself (by the grace of God) I'm so grateful I've been able to participate in this aspect of service in Alcoholics Anonymous.

Despite the many obstacles that we may have as volunteers, I feel so fortunate that I got to bring a little experience, strength and hope inside those walls. There may be a tedious process for badging and seemingly endless hoops for us to jump through, but the women behind the walls don't get to pick and choose which meeting they go to. There are, without a doubt, some who can hardly wait for their one weekly meeting. I cannot express how much truth and gratitude they share for that hour: they are hungry for what we have.

I've been going to the San Carlos Unit for quite some time. At my last meeting, there were at least 20 women, including three attending the first time. One of them admitted it was the first time she had introduced herself as an alcoholic. Mind-blowing. Another one was being released in a few days and she was so excited to go back to her home group. Another, who is a regular attendee and is always enthusiastic about reading and sharing, expressed her current frustration and confusion regarding religion and spirituality. I've some experience with this and got to share it.

During the meeting we read the Big Book story "Keys to the Kingdom," about a woman with a low bottom in early AA who experienced inspiring love and growth in the Fellowship, and insisted on continuous action for a healthy sobriety. Many of the women expressed how much they enjoyed it and identified with it. I told the ladies that this was my last meeting, and they had a lot of questions and were very kind. I made sure they knew that I've another service commitment and that it's vital to my sobriety!

Here's another "odd or God" moment: This past Labor Day weekend I attended the Arizona State Convention in Tucson and, while perusing the archives display, I was approached by a woman who seemed to know me. She had attended the meeting I led in Perryville in July and had been released in August. I was so excited to see her attending an event celebrating sobriety, especially one that was more than 100 miles away.

Goodyear is a bit of a drive from where I live and work. Every month when the day came for me to go, I felt tired after having worked all day, and would've rather done about 20 other things. But every time I left the meeting and the heavy metal doors slammed shut behind me, I gained a little more freedom from alcohol. I've yet to experience another high that compares to walking out into the night air to my car and driving away from Perryville. Freedom from bondage is an extraordinary gift.

Thanks to each and every one of you who do this kind of service, or make it possible, and for allowing me to be a part of it.
