It wasn't who won or lost, it was about the stories the old-timers told

I got sober at a clubhouse in the San Fernando Valley called The Nest. At the time, when you entered The Nest the main AA meeting room was to your left and an overflow area and the kitchen were immediately ahead. The "Half Measures" game room with a pool table and card table was to the right.

Most times of the day, if there wasn't a meeting going on, several old-timers would be seated at the card table playing pinochle. I came from a pinochle-playing family and was immediately drawn to the game. I was an honorable kibitzer and I hoped I would be asked to play, but I was a new-comer and these were men and women with 10, 20, 30, or more years. I didn't really expect to get to play.

One day I came in and looked in the game room. I saw three old-timers sitting at the table. They played a game of double-deck partners, so they needed a fourth. One of them saw me and asked if I would like to join. They didn't have to ask twice. From that point on, I was one of the regulars, getting a fair share of playing time.

This story isn't about the fact that Tom finally got to play pinochle with the old-timers at The Nest. It's about what the players were doing while playing. They were talking. But they weren't just talking about AA. I don't remember a single conversation starting with, "Hey Dale, what do you think about the Seventh Step?" That just didn't happen.

Instead, they talked about what was going on in their lives. They were salesmen, businessmen, tradesmen, professionals. They might have been talking about the big deal they had just landed, or the one that got away. They might have been talking about how their business was going, or not going.

I remember one man speaking about how proud he was of his daughter. She had just graduated from high school and gotten a full scholarship to college. Another man talked about his teenage son, who had just been arrested for drunk driving.

They talked about living the kind of life that I had always dreamed of living, the "What it's like now" part of their stories. Some of these stories were truly dramatic. Looking back on it, I have to admit that more than anything else, the pinochle game at The Nest was the single biggest attraction to AA for me in those early months. I had a chance to hear about the kind of life that I could have in AA, if I followed the same principles that they did.


The 'Page A Day' (PAD) group started in late 2001 as an opportunity to study the Big Book daily. At that time, the 'group' consisted of a few people who met at Tim and Beth H's home. It started with a pot of coffee, a couple of AA's and a drunk sleeping on their couch. As more people crowded their home a decision was made to extend this benefit to others. Thus, outreach was made to the Gilbert Presbyterian Church and with help from groups at the church like 'We Ain't Dead Yet' (WADY), PAD was born.

The group began building momentum through the support and generosity of WADY, which loaned them books, coffee and chips for only \$5.00 per month until the group became self-supporting. In 2002, the newly formed group had regular attendees, with a phone list that was then reflecting approximately 17 members. Over the course of the next few years, the group continued to develop and mold the structure and format of the meeting. The format was loose and informal (we were an open meeting at that time), sometimes we would read less than a page, and sometimes we would read 2-3 pages. In general, the format included serenity Prayer, AA Preamble, a reading from the BB, discussion of that reading (even double dip to fill the time), and a final close at the hour with the Lord's Prayer.

Once the group was comfortably established, service commitments and business meetings began occurring regularly. The group then agreed on a name and registered with the General Service Office (GSO), East Valley Intergroup and Area. As the group established themselves as a "Home Group" they elected trusted servants (GSR, EVI representative, H&I representative, etc.). They continued to meet regularly (every day except Sunday at 6:45AM). By 2006, the group and grown to a total headcount of 72 members.

Through attraction, commitment, and a dedication to principles and traditions, the group has been a veritable Ellis Island of AA. They have welcomed the poor, tired, huddled masses yearning to be free of alcoholism. They have been attended by alcoholics from all over the globe, have associate members who visit regularly, and have also buried many friends. As in any group they have experienced mixed personalities, differing opinions, and various other discussions which have always been left to the group conscience.

Today, in 2017, PAD is a closed meeting and maintains a phone list consisting of over 170 members. Attendance at PAD typically consists of 30-50 participants, always a mix of members and visitors. PAD has always been a strong presence of service and dedication to AA through Area, GSO, H&I and EVI. Their doors still remain open to the suffering Alcoholic as a closed meeting every day but Sunday at 6:45 AM.





The group conscience of AA in the U.S. and Canada seems to have agreed upon six points that define an AA group:

- 1) All members of a group are alcoholics, and all alcoholics are eligible for membership.
- 2) As a group, they are fully self-supporting.
- 3) A group's primary purpose is to help alcoholics recover through the Twelve Steps.
- 4) As a group, they have no outside affiliation.
- 5) As a group, they have no opinion on outside issues.
- 6) As a group, their public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion, and they maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio, TV, and film.

History of the Get It Together Group

We at GIT are lucky to have two members that are still around and can shed some light on the early years of the Get It Together Group. Although they were not at the start of the group they were members early enough to recall the stories of the founding of our group. GIT was founded in 1978 or 1979, we are not exactly sure. We have had a number of annual picnics! We have grown as a group and have moved several times since our inception as an AA group. Our members with the longest membership in the group are Warrene W. and Harry R., and these are some of their memories of the early years of GIT.

The founders of the Get It Together group were Val and his wife (name and last initial unknown), Joe H, Larry W. and Jim M. and when Warrene W. and Harry R. came around in 1980 it was a small but growing group. Some of the other members around when they came in were; Bob F. (current member) Dugan and Mike from Wisconsin, Old George and Montana Jim, Jo, who always said she was a wino and her husband Harley who was a co- alcoholic, Cowboy Norm and Phyllis, aka the dragon Lady. The GIT group was an off shoot of an earlier Chandler meeting that met in a large house. No one knows what the resentment was that caused the break off but the other group is no longer in existence.

GIT used to have anniversary parties, very classy dinners at Williams field Air Force Base and a dinner dance at the Elks Lodge. There was a dinner party every year and at some point they began to have the anniversary dinner in the yard at the Smoke house with a potluck and an auction! This has evolved into our annual fall picnic! GIT also used to have a cake for each individual home group member on there birthday and we have become so large in members we can only do a monthly birthday meeting with cake these days.

The group started on Boston Street in downtown Chandler but no one recalls the address. During Warrene's first AA meeting they were talking about moving to a place on Arizona Avenue and the discussion was heated on whether the group could afford the added expense. Joe H. was very much in favor of the move and it turned out to be good for the group and they were there for many happy years! The types of meetings were very much like today's; open and closed, noon meetings, every night at 8pm, a women's meeting on Saturday morning, Men's Meeting and the Sunday 11th step meeting has always been a part of our schedule!

GIT has moved over the years. They were on Arizona Avenue for 7 to 8 years. They had to move from there because the attorney that owned the building wanted to do something else with it. We spent one year in the vacant old hospital on Chandler Blvd and then moved to the "Old smoke house" on Chandler Blvd. and were there about 8 years. GIT moved from there because there was a caretaker (an AA Member) living in the house and some felt that was a violation of AA principles. We tried then to become an Alano Club so we could keep the caretaker whom was needed to satisfy the lease and maintain the lawn. This issue caused so much dissension that we lost members over it during very heated discussions! We then made the move to Alma School and Ray location and were there for a few years! We eventually made the move to 393 W. Warner in around 1996 or 97. We moved to a larger Suite (105/106), next door, in July of 2012.

Today GIT is flourishing with an approximate membership of 400 or so recovering alcoholics! We really don't know because we keep no records of members. We have around 40 AA meetings per week and are committed to carrying out AA's primary purpose to "stay sober and help Alcoholics to achieve sobriety"! Put the plug in the jug and come see what we are. about! We look forward to seeing you and helping you to stay sober!
