Get a Backbone, Not a Wishbone

I got sober in 1961. I asked Bill W. years ago why we call the Steps the Steps. He said that we climb up with dignity. He also told me we experience the Steps. At times in sobriety we are uncomfortable, and they enable us to pick out what we can change to get comfortable again. They help us quit running from ourselves, our lives and our Higher Powers.

I was at the Babylon group one Monday night. I was early, and this woman was putting out the ashtrays. Her name was Wilma

M. I said to her, "I'm afraid of living and scared of dying." Wilma looked at me and said, "You are not a has-been, you are a never-was. Better get a backbone instead of a wishbone."

Faith in AA and a Higher Power gave me a backbone. It enabled me to try to correct my defects and live with dignity. I no longer was the dog under the table; I was the dog at the table. The Fifth Step enabled me to forgive myself and join the human race. I found out how I had been lying to myself and let fear and anger run my life.

I came into AA at 21. I joined a group, got involved and helped open other new groups. I took a day off every three months to go into New York City to buy literature. I was only making \$40 a week, but AA had given me a life, so I was willing to sacrifice a day's pay.

The old-timers taught me how to love, and my group showed me that I counted. Through the Steps I learned that I didn't have to react to people, but interact with people. I retired from my job. I made a difference and got to grow up as a man of dignity. When I look at my kids I see the principles of AA in them.

An old friend of Bill W.'s once told me that AA will give you a will to live, a life to lead, and a faith to live by.

We all put a lot of work into change, and we put in a lot of effort to keep AA going. Sometimes we would drive 50 miles to keep a commitment. And we all learned to laugh, but we never forgot how much we cried.

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Teenage Nightmare: Confessions of a Young Suicidal Alcoholic

I was already emotionally unstable before I started my career as an alcoholic. Both of my parents were born in Mexico. My parents split when I was about 13. I was happy as a child, but I just went wild. My dad had left the state with his new girlfriend. Now it was just my mom, my sister, and me. I was a freshman when I started drinking, and that same year I started cutting myself.

The following years were nothing but parties, cruising in stranger's cars, fights with the family and a lot of self-destructive behavior. At 16, I became bulimic. I made myself throw up because I felt ugly. Within a year, I was hospitalized at a mental hospital for the third time because of suicide attempts. I have been in and out of AA since I was 16. I worked with a drug counselor, a therapist, and a psychiatrist, and they diagnosed me as a "bipolar, manic-depressive." I was prescribed a variety of meds to help keep me stabilized. The only pills I felt OK with were the mood stabilizers because they helped with my intense emotions and anxiety.

After a relapse when I was 17, I drank with all of my medications. I was heavily drunk when I decided to gulp them. This happened a night before my mom's birthday. I thought my life was over. I was just so tired of waking up and seeing my world dark and clouded. I couldn't bear to look in the mirror. I was numb. I felt as if my life was an endless movie of self-destruction, rejection and abuse—something unreal. It became so unbearable that I finally just gave up. I stayed sober for 13 months and relapsed a few weeks before my 19th birthday. I stayed out for two months and realized that even if I didn't feel like killing myself, even if I had all the things I wanted and was fit and healthy, that alcohol and drugs were not going to clean up the mess I created. I was throwing my life away. Maybe, just maybe, I don't know so much about living life.

Today I am in service every single day—from the moment I wake up to the hour I go to bed. Today I try to be honest with myself so that I know what my real intentions are.

At first being thoroughly honest was hard. I didn't like admitting to humans, God and myself the exact nature of my defects. I still don't like admitting that I'm powerless over everything and everyone. I still don't accept that my life is unmanageable on a daily basis. But all of this is becoming easier for me to do by practicing it and following suggestions from my sponsor. Whenever things get hard, or I don't want to follow through with a suggestion, I simply humble myself to my Higher Power and say, "Just for today." That helps me live in the moment, and accept that—just for today—AA is my reality. I didn't need meds to stay sober, just a Higher Power, a spiritual path and someone to hold my hand through it all. AA has given that to me.

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From the Twelve Steps And Twelve Traditions

Step Ten - Continued to take personal inventory and when we were wrong promptly admitted it.

AS we work the first nine Steps, we prepare ourselves for the adventure of a new life. But when we approach Step Ten we commence to put our A.A. way of living to practical use, day by day, in fair weather or foul. Then comes the acid test: can we stay sober, keep in emotional balance, and live to good purpose under all conditions? A continuous look at our assets and liabilities, and a real desire to learn and grow by this means, are necessities for us. We alcoholics have learned this the hard way. -pg. 88

Central Office Manager's Report September 16, 2022

In August it was hot. We received 488 requests for information and assistance during office hours. Of those 116 calls were for meeting info, 140 were office visitors and 21 resulted in a 12-step call. Our website stayed busy with 24,498 visits. And our Google totals for last month were 34,017 views. Of those 496 went to our website, 86 requested directions and 61 gave us a call.

We received a memo from Grapevine informing us they will be raising prices on their top 10 selling books by \$2.49. The price of their other items will be increased as they go to reprint. That will bring the price of an average Grapevine book to \$14.50. We will continue selling at the old price until we have to reorder. Come stock up for the holidays.

Our insurance company has audited our policy and the amount of additionally insured locations. They have determined that we have been drastically underpaying for the amount of coverage we receive and have adjusted our premium by \$1,951.00 for the remainder of our current policies term. We will be reviewing our insurance needs and gathering quotes next year before our policy ends next year.

I attended the ICOAA seminar held September 1 to 5 in Denver CO. It was so good to be live with the other Office Managers again sharing experience, ideas and inspiration. At our annual GC meeting I was elected to serve as secretary for the next 2 years.

News from NY - Bob W, our GSO General Manager, reported that GSO has 84 employees and GV has 10. Everyone will be working at least 3 days a week in the office and they will reopen for visitors October 5th with mask mandates in place. There is a new person on the Group Services desk. Karrina C from Grapevine will be filling that spot next month.

If your Group has recently had a rotation of officers, please take a Group Update form to your next Group Conscious meeting. Have the new officers fill it out completely and return it to the office or bring it to next month's meeting. It is our policy to have complete contact information for at least 2 officers of each group listed in our directories. Thanks for your help with this.

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With no TV, no radio, and no cell phone, He turned the power on. By Aaron H.

When I was first trying to make contact with something or someone who would love me and accept me, I kept running into roadblocks. This was partly due to my lack of acceptance and love for myself, as well as fear of what other people might think of me. I thought I needed to be absolutely right about a Higher Power in order to be accepted and loved in this world, and perhaps happy in the next, should there be a next one.

I was a full-blown alcoholic when I left high school, and for the next six years, until I got sober in 2000, much of my contact with a Higher Power was unconscious. I blotted out God and filled my life with alcohol and sex. I gave up searching for a Higher Power who would love me.

When I got to AA, I was told that I had to switch back to trying to be filled with the spiritual instead of being filled with the material. I was afraid, but I knew deep down that there had to be a way. I started working the Steps right away. I didn't do them perfectly (I have since learned that that isn't a suggestion). However, I accepted very little direction and guidance and got through the first nine Steps on my own. I was still sober, but I was also lonely and empty on the inside. I had heard people share in my meetings in Michigan about praying on their knees, so I thought I might as well try it.

It was a Sunday afternoon in October. I lived alone, and the television and radio were both off. I didn't have a cell phone, so it was really quiet in my apartment. The amber light was coming through my living room windows, and I got down on my knees for the first time—and I asked for help.

Now I don't know or care how or why, but all of a sudden there was a power and presence in the room with me. And I also instinctively knew that this power and presence loved and accepted me and that it cared about whether or not I lived or died, whether or not I stayed sober, and whether or not I was happy. I also knew—and I can't explain this at all—that this power had been with me the whole time and would continue to do so. I felt warm and loved in a way I had never felt before. I began to cry out of joy like I had never done.

That was 13 years ago. And since that day, I cry with joy often. It's kind of obnoxious and sometimes seems to come from nowhere. I'm a big strong dude, but many times I can't read the Ninth Step Promises aloud in a meeting without tears. But they are tears of joy. Today I know that I'm cared for and loved by a Higher Power that has never broken its anonymity to me.
