NO BOOZE NEWS

<u>As We Understood, Whatever</u>

When I first came into Alcoholics Anonymous, I was put off by all the God stuff. I wouldn't even say the word at the beginning of the Serenity Prayer. I went to an Atheists and Agnostics AA meeting that focused on the book Living Sober, but the meeting lacked something, and I didn't go back. Gradually the words "as we understood Him" began to sink

in. It didn't have to be "his" God or "her" God or some church's God. And it could be "her" or "them" or "it" as well as "him."

What I had to remember is that there is a Higher Power and I'm not it! I shouldn't have had that much trouble with a Higher Power. Alcohol was certainly a power greater than myself: just look how many times I said, "I'm not going to drink today," and then drank. And out in nature I felt right-sized, a part of a much-larger whole.

It took two years and reworking the Steps with my sponsor to get me rigorously honest enough to have that spiritual awakening the Steps are designed to take us to. It happened up in the mountains, crying my eyes out as the sun rose at 14,000 feet. Letting go of stuff that needed letting go of. I came down connected to the human race for the first time in my 50-odd years. I didn't get religion. I don't go to any church, I tend to secularize my prayers, but I don't have to be terminally unique either. What helped me was M. Scott Peck's non-AA book, The Road Less Traveled, where he discusses eminence (outside) and immanence (inside). Instead of some big old guy up in the heavens making decisions for me, I could appreciate the holiness in each and every one of us, and in all things.

I'm living my last years out in the Sonoran Desert which is definitely a power greater than myself. If I go to the desert on my terms I get hurt! I talk to the birds and bunnies and lizards, get a gentle stroke from a tombstone rose tendril, respect the jumping cholla, view ancient petroglyphs with awe, and go to AA meetings with people of all kinds of beliefs. The Twelve Steps brought me to a connection with people, and with the world I live in.

And that is a gift I will always treasure, the gift of joy. I like Anne L's simple three prayers: Help. Thanks. Wow!

Coincidently Sober

Once someone posted on their social media page, "GOD EXISTS." I felt compelled to reply, "Where's your proof?" The response back was, "Coincidences—there are too many to be accidental."My reply was, "I guess I just haven't experienced enough to be convinced."

I have experienced coincidences since I started in AA. The first one occurred when I opened a meeting directory, after finally admitting to myself that I had a problem and needed help. I found a meeting called We Agnostics, located directly across the street from the liquor store that I would walk to at night when I wanted more booze. It was at that meeting that I was able to find a sponsor who I was fairly certain would not be forcing God down my throat. The mere fact that a meeting called We Agnostics existed gave me hope.

The next coincidence occurred after I had read a bit of AA literature. I became concerned about whether I'd be able to stay sober for the long haul since I find it impossible to believe in a god. Would the Fellowship as a Higher Power be enough? That's when a Grapevine magazine arrived in the mail (via a subscription that I had—coincidentally—won in a raffle). In that Grapevine was an article that mentioned a woman who had remained sober for 40 years using the Fellowship as her Higher Power. Forty years! I was relieved to know that indeed you can be an atheist and stay sober for the long haul, that atheism is not a barrier to sobriety.

And here's another coincidence: I volunteered to become a General Services Representative (GSR) for my We Agnostics home group with the hope that I could figure out how I could advocate for the creation of a pamphlet aimed at alcoholics who had a problem with the preponderance of God in AA literature. And the very first GSR-related event I attended was a "Concepts" workshop. And on one of the tables there was a pamphlet titled, "Many Paths to Spirituality," which was pretty much every-thing that I would have advocated for.

Now, if I were one of those folks who believed that coincidences are proof of the existence of God, I would be thinking that God was OK with me being an atheist. I believe God just wants me to get sober, whether I believe in him or not. But since I'm not one who believes that coincidences prove God exists, I'm thinking that the reason there was an agnostic meeting, the reason there was a Grapevine article and the reason there was a pamphlet is because enough frustrated atheist and agnostic members in AA spoke up. And I am so grateful they did because I probably wouldn't be here if they hadn't.

Central Office Manager's Report February 17, 2022

January set the year off to a good start. We received several calls from people concerned about theirs or a loved one's drinking. Twelve step calls were set up, information on our program and directions to the meetings close to them was provided. We received 420 requests for information and assistance. Of those 112 calls were for meeting info, 119 were office visitors and, 7 resulted in a 12- step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 23,171 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google listing received 3,320 views in January with 36 giving us a call, 464 visiting our website and 60 requesting directions to the office.

There are copies of the 2022 Year End Activity Report of your Central Office. Please take a few copies back to your group. This report helps to answer that often-asked question "What does the Intergroup Office do?"

The year-end inventory went well thanks to some very helpful volunteers. Our discrepancy was - \$206.47, with a total retail inventory value of \$23,776.76. We received a literature order that included the new "unjacketed" Big Books and 12 X 12's. Most titles are now available at AAWS with a few pamphlets still out of stock.

Word has it there is a price increase in the near future at AAWS. I will stock up a bit at the old prices and give us some time before we have to raise ours. The W-2 has been distributed and W-3 filed with Social Security. Monthly taxes have been deposited with the IRS.

Service opportunities are always available on all EVI committees and the 12th step list. Gratitude with Service forms are now available on our website. Please encourage your Group members to volunteer for a service position. The life they save may be their own

From...<u>51 Years of Peeling the Onion</u> | Longtimer Stories

At first, I believed that abstinence and service were all I needed to stay sober, so I made the decision to concentrate on the first half of the First Step: "We admitted we were powerless over alcohol." When I was a year sober I got married and found out that I was terrified of intimacy. The only place where I felt safe was at AA meetings, so I went to five or six of them a week. She and I and her son were living in Hawaii then.

When I had about five years sober, I noticed that although I would come home from work at 4:30 P.M. my wife would always be at our neighbor's house, and she'd stay there until about 7:00. I kept asking her why she was always over there and after about six months she finally told me. "The neighbors appreciate me as a person and you don't," she said. "They enjoy my sense of humor and you're threatened by it. The neighbors let me have the last word and you never do." Then she got to the heavier matters. "I thought you would learn to love me, but the only thing you love is yourself," she added. "And if I weren't on this island, I would leave you because I'm getting nothing from you."

I had no smart comeback to that. What went through my mind was the second half of the First Step. My life was unmanageable—drunk or sober. That got my attention. Right away I asked a person who lived and breathed the Steps to be my sponsor. I joined a Step study group, became a daily meeting-goer and started rereading the Big Book. I was struck by the chapter to the agnostic: "Deep down in every man, woman and child is the fundamental idea of God. It may be obscured by calamity, by pomp and by worship of other things, but in some form or other it is there."

Once I began trying not to use calamity, pomp and worship of other things to make me feel good, a sense of peace came over me. I heard that still small voice I had say, "There is nothing wrong with you. Let me take care of you—and you try to take care of others." For the first time in sobriety, my skin seemed to fit. This sense of peace allowed me to take the Second and Third Steps on the spot.
