NO BOOZE NEWS

Even More Valuable | AA, Money and Wealth

At our regular Big Book study meeting one Wednesday, our discussion digressed into an argument about the dated language preserved in Alcoholics Anonymous. There were the usual complaints: "To Wives" is sexist and no one today knows what is meant by "teetotaler" or "in his cups" and so on.

In the end, as always, tradition won out over relevance when it was decided that the exact words of Bill W. trumped all else. Oldtimers insisted that the same words they got sober reading 20, 30 and 40 years ago are good enough for the next generation. In this meeting, our rules about crosstalk were almost completely abandoned in favor of seniority. The meeting chair, enjoying his exciting new 90-day privileges, was loath to ring the bell to call the meeting back to order and soon we were engaged in a competition over who owned the oldest copy of the Big Book.

Numerous examples were presented on the spot, but other claims could not be immediately verified, as people with the oldest copies kept them at home and out of everyday use. We all calmed down and stopped talking over each other.

Waiting her turn, a woman said that she seemed to remember that at one time our group had in its possession an original 1939 Big Book, donated by my own sponsor—a 20-year sober veteran and AA widow—who happened to be at today's meeting. The woman wondered what had become of it.

"We did have a copy of the first edition," my sponsor said. "It was left to my husband by his uncle, who was Twelfth Stepped by Bill W." She said that she and her husband didn't feel that something so precious should be kept to themselves, so they donated it to the group. "Well, the group didn't know what to do with it," she continued.

"Frankly, our group didn't want to take responsibility for it. Suppose someone broke into our building in order to steal it? I mean, a first edition was going for thousands of dollars at the time."

I love books, but I couldn't imagine wanting any book more than I would want thousands of dollars. I admired my sponsor's character.

"The book was passed along to Intergroup and kept in a safety-deposit box until a meeting could be held to decide what to do with it," my sponsor added. "The district archives couldn't accept it for the same reason that our group didn't want to be responsible for it."

By now the entire situation seemed ludicrous to me. Why didn't our group just sell it? We could have done a lot with the money. But I remembered vaguely hearing something to the effect that our group was prohibited from accumulating unnecessary wealth. It might have been part of the Twelve Concepts, but I wasn't sure. Couldn't we have sent the money on to our area or district or to AA World Services? Someone said donation amounts were strictly limited.

"In the end," my sponsor continued, "we were able to send the book along to our area archives, who could accommodate it safely while still allowing visitors to enjoy it."

With the mystery solved, the meeting moved on to other topics, but I just couldn't let go of the idea of that money. Why did we have such a stringent Seventh Tradition? What was wrong with more money with which to do more good? Why corporate poverty?

It was then brought home to me for the first time that AA is not a charity. Outside of paying its bills, AA has no use for money. What AA has to offer is something that no other entity supplies and that no amount of money can buy. The members of my group have come from all walks of life. Thanks to AA's community outreach efforts, we have been referred to the program by our doctors, hospitals, clergymen, and therapists. Hadn't I been directed to AA at the end of my stay in rehab that, while expensive, could not offer an ongoing solution to my alcoholism? In the end, all roads lead to AA.

I remember as a little girl hearing a Bible story that never quite made sense to me. In this story, Jesus was talking to a group of people when a woman approached him and poured an expensive bottle of perfume over him. Someone criticized the act, saying that the perfume could have been sold and the money given to the poor. However, Jesus praised the woman for what she had done. When I heard this story as a little girl, I felt the same way as the critic. Why the waste? I agreed that the money from the sale of the perfume could have gone to benefit the poor, about whom Jesus was always concerned.

Hearing the story of the first edition Big Book in our meeting, I was able to understand that Gospel story for the first time. The principle is that there are some things money cannot buy and chief among those are spiritual growth. Jesus also said, "It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God."

For a rich man today to get sober is absolutely possible, but he doesn't need money to do it. I love that our program is spiritual, not material, and therefore equally available, if not easy, to all.

But when we have taken a square look at some of these defects, have discussed them with another, and have become willing to have them removed, our thinking about humility commences to have a wider meaning. By this time in all probability, we have gained some measure of release from our more devastating handicaps. We enjoy moments in which there is something like real peace of mind. To those of us who have hitherto known only excitement, depression, or anxiety—in other words, to all of us—this newfound peace is a priceless gift.





Central Office Manager's Report May 19, 2023

In May we received 431 requests for information and assistance. Of those 113 calls were for meeting info, 124 were office visitors and 13 resulted in a 12-step call. Our website stayed busy too. It had 20,637 visits in the last 30 days. Our Google totals for May were 2,672 views. Of those 283 went to our website, 73 requested directions and 71 gave us a call.

Our literature prices have been increased to match AAWS pricing. Books went up 20% and pamphlets 30% on average. We have placed and received orders at the new prices. QuickBooks has ended support to our version of their software. It has not affected our operations yet, but we will need to upgrade this soon.

Our insurance is set to renew July 1 for \$4,269. Last year the same coverage cost \$2,846 and the previous years were \$920. We had hoped to receive a quote from another company but when they realized how many additional locations we were covering they declined. All updated and corrected certificates will be sent to the leaseholders of participating groups.

Please see the additional report on our potential ERC refund from the IRS.

We need office volunteers. Morning and afternoon shifts are available. Please discuss with your group all the service opportunities that are available thru your East Valley Intergroup. Answer the A.A. hotline, go on an old fashioned 12 step call, take a meeting to a home bound member, share information about A.A. with the public and professional community, help put on an event, print and fold directories and newsletters or take a shift at the office. These are just a few of the services we provide and it takes hundreds of volunteers. Please take some Gratitude with Service forms back to your group and encourage them to volunteer. The life you save may be your own.

The Longer She Stayed Sober, The Bigger Her Life Got

When I first got sober in 1977, I started to follow a path of sobriety. I got a sponsor and bought the Big Book and the Twelve by Twelve.

At first it was difficult to stay on the path as it was very narrow. My compulsion to drink was a daily battle and the only way that I could stay sober was to go to meetings and call my sponsor in between and read the Big Book or other AA literature.

I had to think about everything I did and make sure that it was not going to lead me in the wrong direction. I went to work every day and to a meeting every night. I became familiar with the Steps and became closer to my Higher Power whom I call God. At first my recovery was very regimented. I did the same thing every day in order to stay away from the drink.

As I started to work the Steps, I became more comfortable in my own skin and in the AA meetings. I gradually widened the path to include other activities where there was no drinking. Family functions, class reunions, weddings and other such activities came later in sobriety.

Prayer was incorporated into my life again and my life started to become normal. I could go shopping and not worry about walking down the liquor aisle, I could go listen to my son play his music which was sometimes in a bar setting. If my reason for being there was legitimate, I could go places that I had to avoid in the beginning of my sobriety.

Again I felt that my path was getting wider. AA had allowed me to become a whole human being and to become a contributing member of society without fear of taking a drink. The path had widened enough to allow this. With a balanced program of recovery and other activities, I was able to function in the real world with out the fear of drinking.

The road to recovery had become a highway to success. Keeping my priorities straight, keeping my focus on the principles of the AA program and incorporating these principles into my daily living, I am able to be a happy, joyous and free alcoholic today.
